PREFACE

This Companion offers a comprehensive, authoritative and lively guide to Australian history. It covers all periods and aspects of Australian history. It rests on the most recent and significant scholarship. And it is written, as far as possible, in clear, vivid, non-technical language. We hope that it will become the book of first reference for academic and general historians, students of Australian history, journalists and politicians, and readers here and overseas.

It draws on a large body of specialist scholarship, including work done by historians inside and outside the academy, as well as by other researchers and writers. Thirty years ago a keen student could claim a reading knowledge of almost all the significant writing on Australian history; but the volume of new work has so grown in range and specialisation that even professional historians can hope to remain in command of only a fraction of what is published. The *Companion* aims to make the fruit of this work available to a general readership in a form that summarises its findings and points the way towards a more detailed understanding of the topic. Some of this work is available in books, journals, and other forms of publication, but much of it is specialised and not easily accessible. The *Companion* draws also on key reference works such as the *Australian Dictionary of Biography*, the *Australian National Dictionary*, *Australians: A Historical Dictionary*, and other publications listed in the entry for **reference works**; but complements these as a systematic guide to Australian history.

The Companion consists of entries varying in length from 100 to 2000 words on a wide range of subjects: events, persons, topics, themes, catchphrases, and allusions. The significance of the subject has been a fundamental criterion for selection of the entries and determination of their length, but at a time when the understanding of Australian history is keenly contested, this criterion is itself open to challenge. The new understandings of Australia's past conveyed by feminist and Aboriginal scholarship, for example, call for different emphases from the older treatments that stressed national events and the achievement of notable public figures. Our approach has been to assess significance according to the changing balance of historical scholarship. Thus the reader will find an explanation of the **Ripon Regulations** and other such staple fare of colonial history; but there is also recognition of **Aboriginal resistance** leaders and **femininity** as important areas of recent attention.

The Companion aims to show how Australia's history has been interpreted as well as how it has been made. There are major entries on branches of history, such as **environmental history** and **religious history**, which offer both a survey of the field and a commentary on the changing approaches and methods of those who have worked in it. Other entries on institutions, individuals, and aspects of Australian life also identify and comment on the way their subjects have been understood and assessed. This dimension of historical recording and commentary extends beyond academic study to take in popular writing, fiction, art, public display, film, and television, and these forms are also considered where appropriate.

In the Australian Dictionary of Biography, Australians already have at their disposal one of the world's outstanding biographical dictionaries. By including biographical entries in the Companion we have sought not to duplicate it but to select those individuals who because of their influence, representative character, or claim upon the attention of historians have assumed special significance in Australian history. Thus while all prime ministers and most governors prior to the introduction of representative government are

included, only a selection of colonial and state premiers and religious and business leaders have entries. The Companion departs from the convention of biographical dictionaries that provide systematic details of parentage, education, appointments and offices, marriage and descendants. We have instead selected the most important aspect of each subject's career for discussion and evaluation. Similarly, we have listed honours and distinctions only when these are relevant to the entry.

The Companion pays particular attention to the interpreters of Australia history. It includes entries on a large number of writers and scholars, past and present, who have contributed to the understanding of the subject. Most, but by no means all, are historians: the principle for inclusion of novelists, dramatists, poets, artists, film-makers, and other cultural creators has been their role in shaping historical consciousness. The entries for living historians are generally confined to those who have completed their professional careers, though a few exceptions are made for younger historians who have exerted a particular influence.

The editorial group has written a significant proportion of the longer entries and the great bulk of the shorter ones. In commissioning entries we have invited leading scholars in the field, but—in conformity with the principle that the entry should assess the published work on that subject—have generally sought to ensure that contributors write on subjects in which their own work is not central. An effort was made to include contributors from different parts of the country, and to achieve some gender balance: the inability of some to accept our invitation to contribute has modified, but we hope not compromised, this intention.

Since the first publication of the *Companion* in 1998 we have been pleased to receive many appreciative comments from readers and reviewers. It is clear that the book is already fulfilling our hope of bringing the fruit of recent Australian historical scholarship to a wide audience of journalists, museum professionals, teachers, and general readers. Our correspondents have also offered criticisms, corrections, and suggestions for new entries. In due course, we hope to produce a new and expanded edition incorporating many of these suggestions as well as our own new thinking. In the meantime, this revised edition enables us to make a number of additions designed to bring the *Companion* up to date and to correct a small number of errors in the first printing. We have expanded some entries, such as those on John Howard and Olympic Games, to take account of significant events since 1998. We have revised the references to include important new publications. And in some instances, such as entries on Aboriginal topics, we have taken account of new developments in historiography. Among the many who have assisted us in this revision, we wish to make special mention of Kim Torney, for whom *The Oxford Companion to Australian History* has become almost a constant companion.

HOW TO USE THE COMPANION

Entries are arranged in alphabetical order.

A word in bold within the text (e.g. 'Ned **Kelly** was eventually hanged') indicates a cross-reference to another relevant headword. An item appears in bold only at its first appearance in an individual entry; if the reference is merely incidental, it has not been marked. Within entries covering notable families, such as the Boyds and the Sutherlands, the names of individual family members not given separate entries of their own appear in capitals.

In some cases, the word in bold differs slightly from the headword. For example, the term 'Communist Party of Australia' appears thus in some entries while the actual headword is Communism; 'Constitutional crisis' appears thus although the headword of the relevant entry is Constitutional crises. These variations are made for reasons of euphony and only where the actual headword will be found in correct alphabetical order.

In biographical entries where the subject has a pseudonym, the headword uses the name by which the subject is best known. Thus the entry for Joseph **Furphy** appears under that headword and not that of his nom-de-plume, Tom Collins; but the entry for A.H. Davis appears under Steele **Rudd**, and Nellie **Melba** appears thus rather than under her natal name, Helen Porter Mitchell.

'See also' at the end of an entry indicates that there is another substantial entry with a bearing on the subject.

The subject index at the back of the book is intended to reinforce the system of cross-references and to make it easier for readers to identify entries of kindred interest.

The authors of all longer entries are identified. A number of short entries were written in-house and involved substantial collaboration; accordingly they are identified by the initials of the member of the editorial team who drafted the entry:

The Companion guides the reader to the relevant literature. The method of citation is kept as spare as possible. A book is usually identified by author, short title, and date of publication; sometimes one of the first two items is omitted, but the details are sufficient to find an item through an author or title entry in a library catalogue. Journal articles are usually identified by the name of the journal and the year in which it was published. Unpublished theses are identified by title, institution, and date of completion, and the cumulative guide to higher degree theses that enables them to be located is included in the entry on **reference works**. Films are dated by the year of release.

Maps are to be found at the end of the book, preceding the index.
