This encyclopaedic dictionary is a careful attempt to deal with the terms and concepts used in every area of sociology, and to related terms in psychology, economics, political science and anthropology. This has been adited to provide students of sociology at all levels with a handy and reliable source for the entries which range from bureaucracy to critical theory, epistemology to gender and suicide to working class conservation. Entries have been taken from sociology, sociological research, social interaction, social systems, society, culture, sex roles and orientation, social groups, collective behaviour, social startification, religion, social control, models of society, etc. It is to be noted that this dictionary does not set out to be a comprehensive or a definitive work of scholarship, e.g. it is relatively little concerned with the complex etymologies of terms or to convey all usages. Rather its main function is to function as a study aid.
