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PREFACE TO THE UPDATED TENTH EDITION

I am sad to note the passing of Jon Waltz, the senior author of our casebook. Jon died on January 9, 2004. Jon's wit and keen intelligence gladdened the lives of those who knew him, and his gifts added greatly to the value of the book. This edition is dedicated to him.

The purpose of this Updated Tenth Edition is to take account of the changes brought by *Crawford v. Washington*, 541 U.S. 36 (2004). This edition includes the *Crawford* case and lower court cases that interpret *Crawford's* concept of "testimonial" evidence. New material on forfeiture of objections has also been added. The Confrontation Clause cases decided between *Ohio v. Roberts* and *Crawford* have been replaced by a note describing them.

We thought that the *Crawford* upheaval justified a revision of the main volume, as opposed to a Supplement. Many instructors will want to discuss the impact of *Crawford* on cases that are encountered elsewhere in the book. Opportunities to do so arise not only in the hearsay chapter, but also in the chapters on expert testimony, on impeachment and rehabilitation, and on writings. Having the case and its sequelae in the main volume makes it more likely that students will have the material handy in every class.

Fortunately, the *Crawford*-related material fills the same space as the material that it replaced, so page numbers before and after the new material remain the same. For example, the *Daubert* case starts on p. 867 in both the Tenth Edition and in this Updated Tenth Edition. We hope that this feature will reduce the need to change page numbers in syllabi and class notes.

We have profited from the comments of many users of this casebook. We are grateful for their communications and have often been influenced by their suggestions. Though many have contributed, we owe special thanks to Richard Friedman, Norman Garland, Paul McKaskle, Richard Marcus, and Fred Moss. We have retained the questions from Judge Bernard Jefferson's CALIFORNIA EVIDENCE BENCHBOOK that were printed in earlier editions, and wish to note our debt to that work.

As in other editions, footnotes and citations to authority have been eliminated from cases and text without special notation.
