Preface

■ A COMPREHENSIVE, FOCUSED READER

The selections in this anthology all take as their subject key behaviors that research has shown are central to the success of all new college students—commuters or residential, urban or suburban, "majority" or "minority," traditional or returning. To this end, the book combines the perspectives and expertise of more than thirty veteran instructors of college success. Some themes emerge throughout the readings:

- Building friendships, support groups, and contact with teachers
- Self-awareness and growth in terms of personal resources, goals, and commitment
- An analytic frame of mind that integrates study skills with focused critical thinking and an appreciation of the liberal arts
- Awareness of the new technology of computers and the Internet, the World Wide Web, and e-mail as tools for communication and learning
- · Ways in which diversity touches and enhances each of our lives

The brevity of a reader format and the careful focus of each piece have allowed us to include a broader range of topics than was possible in previous editions of *Your College Experience* or that will be found in other texts. The Reader includes all standard topics, such as time management, learning styles, and study skills; topics previously available only by custom order, such as money management, wellness, leadership, and the place of women in American higher education; and four newly commissioned readings on American higher education, college success for minority students, the importance of the liberal arts, and personal relationships and campus involvement.

■ COMPANION WORKBOOK

The Reader can be used alone or with its matching Workbook. We recommend this new separate reader/workbook format as a way for instructors to more effectively monitor their students' work and still respect students' understandable reluctance to tear pages out of a text in order to turn them in.

In addition to virtually all the exercises from single-volume editions of *Your College Experience*, the Workbook includes:

- · A summary log of each chapter's assignments
- Journal and Chapter Reflection questions for written responses to each chapter
- Objective quizzes to monitor students' comprehension of the Reader

- Emphasis throughout on self-assessment, writing, systematic critical thinking, group work, and goal-directed behavior, as well as sensible activities to discover the uses of important new technologies
