


Figure 9-12 Foreign Investments in the U.S. Figure B9-1 Spring-Break Migration Figure B9-2 World Literacy Rates Figure 9-19	40 41 43 43	Figure 13-6 Oil Spills in the Persian Gulf Figure B13-2 Desertification Figure 13-9 Tropical Rainforests of the World	57 57 58




Fault Lines of California Figure CO1-B






















