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Preface

Why another large text on nephrology? Because this one is *different*. It begins not with the anatomy of the nephron, but with the approach to the renal patient. It is intended as a text on *clinical nephrology*, of primary use to those caring for patients with renal disease. Not that we do not value the science that underlies our clinical practice—far from it. In each section the basic science relevant to the problem under discussion will be found incorporated at the appropriate point in the text for the clinician. In this area we have had the assistance of one of the foremost renal physiologists.

We deal in this book with many of the rarer renal problems and renal manifestations of systemic disease that are not dealt with in other texts—as a glance at the index and that of other similar volumes will show. A unique feature of the book is that at the end we have provided a guide to the book from the point of view of other specialist physicians—gastroenterologists, rheumatologists, neurologists, and so on—so that both they and generalists can enter the complex world of nephrology more easily. We have paid special attention to the handling of drugs by the kidney, and to the effects of drugs upon the kidney and renal tract. In this we have been assisted by our distinguished editor in clinical pharmacology.

We have tried to look at nephrology in a global context,

remembering that the great majority of patients with renal diseases live in the developing world. Several chapters deal specifically with nephrology as it is seen in the tropics. We have also included chapters which deal with renal disease at the extremes of life. Paediatric nephrology has been blended into the text throughout with the assistance of our able paediatric editor, and several chapters deal with the special problems of the growing number of elderly patients with renal disease.

Finally, we hope that these volumes will be, as well as for day-to-day use when needed, a useful and pleasurable source for browsing when the pressure is off. Above all we hope that these volumes will be a literate as well as a comprehensive guide to diseases of the kidney, and diseases affecting the kidney. We thank our Associate Editors Luis Hernando, Claudio Ponticelli, Andy Rees, Charles van Ypersele de Strihou, and C. J. Winearls without whom these volumes could never have been completed.
