Contemporary Authors (CA) provides information on approximately 100,000 writers in a wide range of media, including:

- Current writers of fiction, nonfiction, poetry, and drama whose works have been issued by commercial publishers, risk publishers, or university presses (authors whose books have been published only by known vanity or author-subsidized firms are ordinarily not included)
- Prominent print and broadcast journalists, editors, photojournalists, syndicated cartoonists, graphic novelists, screenwriters, television scriptwriters, and other media people
- Authors who write in languages other than English, provided their works have been published in the United States or translated into English
- Literary greats of the early twentieth century whose works are popular in today's high school and college curriculums and continue to elicit critical attention


A CA listing entails no charge or obligation. Authors are included on the basis of the above criteria and their interest to CA users. Sources of potential listees include trade periodicals, publishers' catalogs, librarians, and other users.

How to Get the Most out of CA: Use the Index

The key to locating an author's most recent entry is the CA cumulative index, which is published separately and distributed with even-numbered original volumes and odd-numbered revision volumes. It provides access to all entries in CA and Contemporary Authors New Revision Series (CANR). Always consult the latest index to find an author's most recent entry.

How Are Entries Compiled?

The editors make every effort to secure new information directly from the authors; listees' responses to our questionnaires and query letters provide most of the information featured in CA. For deceased writers, or those who fail to reply to requests for data, we consult other reliable biographical sources, such as those indexed in Gale's Biography and Genealogy Master Index, and bibliographical sources, including National Union Catalog, LC MARC, and British National Bibliography. Further details come from published interviews, feature stories, and book reviews, as well as information supplied by the authors' publishers and agents.

An asterisk (*) at the end of a sketch indicates that the listing has been compiled from secondary sources believed to be reliable but has not been personally verified for this edition by the author sketched.

What Kinds of Information Does an Entry Provide?

Sketches in CA contain the following biographical and bibliographical information:

- Entry heading: the most complete form of author's name, plus any pseudonyms or name variations used for writing
- **Personal information:** author's date and place of birth, family data, ethnicity, educational background, political and religious affiliations, and hobbies and leisure interests
- Addresses: author's home, office, or agent's addresses, plus e-mail and fax numbers, as available
- Career summary: name of employer, position, and dates held for each career post; resume of other vocational achievements; military service
- Membership information: professional, civic, and other association memberships and any
 official posts held
- Awards and honors: military and civic citations, major prizes and nominations, fellowships, grants, and honorary degrees
- Writings: a comprehensive, chronological list of titles, publishers, dates of original publication and revised editions, and production information for plays, television scripts, and screenplays
- Adaptations: a list of films, plays, and other media which have been adapted from the author's work
- Work in progress: current or planned projects, with dates of completion and/or publication, and expected publisher, when known
- Sidelights: a biographical portrait of the author's development; information about the critical reception of the author's works; revealing comments, often by the author, on personal interests, aspirations, motivations, and thoughts on writing
- Biographical and critical sources: a list of books and periodicals in which additional information on an author's life and/or writings appears

Obituary Notices in *CA* provide date and place of birth as well as death information about authors whose full-length sketches appeared in the series before their deaths. These entries also summarize the authors' careers and writings and list other sources of biographical and death information.

Related Titles in the CA Series

Contemporary Authors Autobiography Series complements CA original and revised volumes with specially commissioned autobiographical essays by important current authors, illustrated with personal photographs they provide. Common topics include their motivations for writing, the people and experiences that shaped their careers, the rewards they derive from their work, and their impressions of the current literary scene.

Contemporary Authors Bibliographical Series surveys writings by and about important American authors since World War II. Each volume concentrates on a specific genre and features approximately ten writers; entries list works written by and about the author and contain a bibliographical essay discussing the merits and deficiencies of major critical and scholarly studies in detail.

Available in Electronic Formats

CD-ROM. Full-text bio-bibliographic entries from the entire *CA* series, covering approximately 100,000 writers, are available on CD-ROM through lease and purchase plans. The disc combines entries from the *CA*, *CANR*, and *Contemporary Authors Permanent Series* (*CAP*) print series to provide the most recent author listing. It can be searched by name, title, subject/genre, nationality/ethnicity, personal data, and as well as advanced searching using boolean logic. The disc is updated every six months. A Sampling of Authors and Media People Featured in This Volume

Mumia Abu-Jamal

Abu-Jamal is an award-winning journalist convicted of killing a police officer; he faces a death sentence, despite evidence that he is innocent. He relates his controversial story in *Live from Death Row*.

Chris Columbus

Columbus is the director of such popular films as *Home Alone* and *Mrs. Doubtfire*. He is also an accomplished screenwriter, with the films *Gremlins* and *Young Sherlock Holmes* to his credit.

Andre de Toth

A noted director of motion pictures in both America and his native Hungary, de Toth was at the helm on such films as the horror classic *House of Wax*. His memoir, *Fragments: Portraits from the Inside*, details his life and art.

Michael D'Orso

D'Orso is an established journalist and the author of a number of award-winning books. Among his better known works is *Like Judgment Day: The Ruin and Redemption of a Town Called Rosewood*.

Salvador Espriu

Twice nominated for the Nobel Prize in literature, Espriu is considered one of the finest Spanish writers of the twentieth century. His works include the biblical collection *Israel:* Esbozos biblicos and the dramatic monologue El Dr. Rip.

Lowell Ganz

Ganz began as a writer on such television series as *Happy Days* and *Laverne and Shirley*. With his partner Babaloo Mandel, he has made a successful career as the screenwriter of films like *Splash*, *Parenthood*, and *City Slickers*.

Bill Gates

As the founder and chair of software giant Microsoft, Gates has built a computer empire that has made him the richest man in the world. His book, *The Road Ahead*, outlines his vision of the world's technological future.

Temple Grandin

Born with autism, Grandin is an inventor who has made significant advances in animal handling and slaughter. She is also a notable author on the subject of autism and works to foster greater understanding of the affliction.

Laura Kasischke

An award-winning poet, Kasischke broke into fiction with her novel *Suspicious River*. The book elicited praise from literary critics and readers alike for its horrific imagery of small-town life.

Caroline Knapp

As an editor for the *Boston Phoenix*, Knapp wrote a humorous advice column under the pseudonym Alice K. In 1996, she adopted a more a serious tone in her autobiographical work, *Drinking: A Love Story*.

Babaloo Mandel

An Academy Award-nominated screenwriter and producer, Mandel is best known for his collaborations with fellow comedy writer Lowell Ganz. The duo gained notoriety with their work on such films as *Night Shift* and *Parenthood*.

Jane Mendelsohn

Mendelsohn's novel, *I Was Amelia Earhart*, made an impressive debut, selling over 150,000 copies within months of its release. The novel is a story of what could have happened had Earhart survived the ill-fated plane crash.

David J. Remnick

Remnick, a former foreign correspondent for the Washington Post, received the Pulitzer Prize for non-fiction in 1993, for Lenin's Tomb. In the book Remnick details the fall of the Soviet Union from 1991-93.

Henry Rollins

Rollins, a writer and musician, has drawn attention as the lead singer for the bands Black Flag and the Rollins Band. In his book, *Get In the Van: On the Road with Black Flag*, he chronicles his experiences from 1981-86.

Wislawa Szymborska

Polish-born poet and critic Szymborska received international attention in 1996 after winning the Nobel Prize for Literature. Her poetry brought attention to Poland's unrecognized, diverse poetic modes.

Emma Thompson

Thompson's screenplay adaptation of the Jane Austen novel Sense and Sensibility earned her an Academy Award in 1996. The screenplay was published along with journal entries from Thompson's film diaries.

WORK IN PROGRESS: A sequel to Warriorwards, continuing the series.

SIDELIGHTS: Dafydd ab Hugh clearly writes in the sword-and-sorcery sub-genre, and his first two books, Heroing and Warriorwards, have as the heroine Jiana Analena, a swordswoman with strong magical powers. The first book, Heroing, takes the apparent form of a quest novel. Jiana seeks to join the party of Prince Alanai of Bay Bay in his quest for a magical artefact with the power to grant one wish, even if that wish means remaking the world. Jiana is turned down because she is a woman, with instructions to go home to her husband or father. But she is determined to join the quest in search of "foreverness," in search of a name. As she says: "I've fought creatures that would make Alanai's hair straighten! And I've won and lost enough treasure to buy a ladyship and a nice manor house on the coast somewhere. But who the hell's ever heard of me? When I'm dead, who's going to remember my name? I want to live forever-on tongues, if not in time! I want immortality."

Jiana begins following Prince Alanai's party, hoping to do some grand deed that will compel the Prince to allow her to join him. She eventually redefines her quest's purpose after seeing the destruction left by the "heros." Her altered quest is to stop Prince Alanai from attaining the magical artefact and remaking the world. She does succeed in sneaking it out from under his nose, but then is uncertain what to do with it; she has learned not to trust the desire for power, not to try to remake the world because of her fear of unintended consequences.

Along the way she has attracted an admirer and apprentice: the innocent farm-boy Dida; she learns the consequences of taking responsibility for someone. Already unhappy at his love being spurned, Dida is captured by Prince Alanai's forces. The next time they meet, Dida has willingly joined with the Prince on his quest. At the end of the quest, as soldiers filled with the rage of battle destroy the ancient city where the magical artefact has been hidden, Dida rapes a young girl and is driven to near madness with selfloathing. Jiana finds him and, when Dida expresses his inability to live with what he's done, gives him a knife. Somewhat to her surprise, he kills himself. Full of grief, rage, and guilt, blaming herself for having caused Dida to go wrong, Jiana uses the magical artefact to bring him back to life.

Prince Alanai is, naturally, enraged at this "waste." "WE COULD HAVE BEEN GODS!" he screams at her. To which she replies, "I know I'm a true warrior. I held the world in my palm—literally!—and I put it down again. Can you say the same?" The Prince, defeated, leaves, Jiana makes plans to go off with Dida, and the book is over with this apparently happy ending.

It is not long into Warriorwards before we learn that things did not turn out well and we see the long-term results of Jiana's heroism. Four years later, Dida has become an arrogant member of the ruling house's soldiery. Jiana has her name and the fame she desired, yet she feels like a failure, primarily because of how Dida turned out. Inspired by a vision given to her by a seer, she determines to take another apprentice, but to do it right this time. Her choice, or rather her destiny, is a girl with a crippled arm named Radience, a slave in the caravan of a Caliph of Tool. Jiana has herself sold into slavery among the Toolians. The rest of Warriorwards is devoted, as one might guess from the title, to Radience's training as a warrior. Jiana acts as a classic drill sergeant, teaching Radience not just technique, but to think and act as a warrior. Radience eventually betrays Jiana, but Jiana is able to escape. A third book was promised at the end of Warriorwards.

AWARDS, HONORS: Peabody Award for a radio essay.

WRITINGS:

Live from Death Row, Addison-Wesley (Reading, MA), 1995.

Has continued to write from prison about racial inequality and the criminal justice system. Contributor to periodicals, including *Nation* and *Yale Law Journal*. Some writings have appeared under the name Wesley Cook.

ADAPTATIONS: HBO released a documentary, Mumia Abu-Jamal: A Case for Reasonable Doubt, based on the case, and Court-TV, in collaboration with HBO, staged a panel discussion, both 1996.

SIDELIGHTS: Mumia Abu-Jamal, an award-winning journalist and radio essayist, was arrested in 1981 for allegedly killing Philadelphia Police Officer Daniel Faulkner. Abu-Jamal has vigorously denied the charge, but on July 3, 1982, he was convicted of murder in the first degree and sentenced to death. Ever since his conviction, Abu-Jamal has been writing essays and commentaries about his observations on race, prison, and punishment from his prison cell.

In 1994, Abu-Jamal's observations were scheduled to air on a National Public Radio (NPR) program. Philadelphia police organizations launched a very visible protest, and members of Congress threatened to cut funding to NPR if they aired the controversial convict's essays. NPR withdrew the programming,

but the commentaries and other writings by Abu-Jamal were published in his 1995 book *Live from* Death Row.

The publication of Live from Death Row incited more discord, and many literary personalities lined up on both sides of the debate: Should a man convicted of murdering a police officer be allowed to publish a book? Before the work was released, Faulkner's widow had launched a campaign to keep Abu-Jamal's book from being published, and after her attempt failed, she tried to prevent Abu-Jamal from making any money on the project.

The counterpoint to these debates was the plight of the man who had written the book. Shortly after the book's publication, Pennsylvania Governor Tom Ridge signed a warrant scheduling Abu-Jamal's execution for August 17, 1995. Abu-Jamal had been fighting for a second trial, given serious problems with the first trial—including allegations of suppressed evidence. Adding interest to his quest for a new trial is the fact that Abu-Jamal was a well-known radical, a former Black Panther who had spent much of his pre-arrest career criticizing the Philadelphia police department for poor race relations.

Critical response to Abu-Jamal's Live from Death Row was mixed. Michael Anderson, writing in the New York Times Book Review, asserted that Abu-Jamal's book does little to persuade people who may disagree with him, claiming that after reading the book "skeptics are likely to remain so." A critic in Publishers Weekly commented that Live from Death Row "presents a bracing challenge to complacent views about crime, race and incarceration." Nation contributor Patricia J. Williams defended Abu-Jamal's right to express himself while incarcerated claiming that "when we engage in the public pretense that there are no voices in the bonfires on the other side of prison walls, we conspire only in the ultimate loss of our own."
