# Preface

Although the first federal statutes prohibiting discrimination on the basis of disability (Sections 501, 503 and 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973) were passed thirty years ago, the law with respect to disability-based discrimination has matured greatly in the last several years. The passage of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) in 1990, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability in a wide array of areas, as well as the Fair Housing Act Amendments of 1988 (FHAA) and amendments to the Individuals With Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), have resulted in a vastly expanding body of the law. The federal government's rapid development of voluminous regulations and guidance statements interpreting these laws has provided the courts with a great deal of material to interpret in resolving cases under the disability antidiscrimination laws.

Until recently, the law of disability discrimination was not taught at most law schools in the United States. Aspects of the topic were, at best, covered in courses on employment discrimination or elder law. Today, however, it is no longer possible to understand the law of disability discrimination without a solid understanding of the ADA and other disability discrimination laws. The purpose of this book is to provide students with an in-depth understanding of the ADA, including the sections governing employment (Title I), public entities (Title II), and public accommodations (Title III). The book focuses on the major components of the ADA, with extensive reference to the implementing regulations and accompanying guidance statements—essential building blocks for a complete understanding of the Act. It also covers a wide range of additional topics, such as education, housing, insurance, and the protection of newborns with disabilities, with discussion of the FHAA and the IDEA. Because the ADA intersects several other federal statutes, such as the IDEA, the FHAA, and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act, cross-references to these and other statutes will frequently be provided. It is important to understand, however, that the law of disability-based discrimination is very broad, and covers a multitude of issues not addressed in this text. By way of example, this casebook does

not attempt to survey the constitutional and state law protections available to people with disabilities.

The principal method of instruction in this book is via presentation of cases followed by notes and problems discussing the cases and related issues. In addition, since this area of the law is so new, we have created hypotheticals illustrating issues that will or may soon confront the courts. The purpose of this text is to identify and discuss significant questions and issues—both current and potential—rather than to provide “right answers” to the questions and issues posed.

For purposes of clarity, the reader should know that citations and footnotes have been omitted from the cases and other materials included in this book without specifically noting that omissions have been made; footnotes remaining in excerpted materials retain their original numbers.
