

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Introduction

1.1 The Commission on the Limits of the Continental Shelf

The rules of international law concerning the continental shelf that today apply to the vast majority of the world's states are found in the 1982 United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (the LOS Convention).¹ This Convention builds on several decades of economic, political and legal developments, of which the final stage—its implementation—is currently ongoing.

Article 76 is among the key provisions of the LOS Convention. Marked by its exceptional complexity, it defines the continental shelf by criteria that differ considerably from those under Article 1 of the 1958 Convention on the Continental Shelf. Notably, Article 76 brings a new *identification* of the outer limits of the continental shelf by reference to geographical and, especially, geological features. The provision establishes the right of coastal states to determine the outer limits of the continental shelf by means of two criteria: based on a distance of 200 nautical miles from the territorial sea baselines, or based on natural prolongation to the end of the continental margin. These two criteria differ in nature. Whereas 200 nautical miles is a distance limit that need not necessarily correspond to that part of the continental shelf which is a natural prolongation of the continent under the sea, the outer edge of the continental margin denotes a geo-morphological feature determinable in terms of geology and susceptible to the natural prolongation test.³

For cases where a coastal state intends to claim a continental shelf extending beyond 200 nautical miles from the baselines from which the breadth

The LOS Convention comprises 320 Articles and nine Annexes, governing all aspects of ocean space, such as delimitation of maritime zones, environmental control, marine scientific research, economic and commercial activities, transfer of technology and the settlement of disputes relating to maritime areas and resources.
