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# PREFACE

This, the ninth edition of the single volume Textbook of Pediatrics,\* has provided the editor his first opportunity to share editing responsibilities with medical colleagues. The relentless progression of time as it applies to the individual is sufficient reason to bring in younger blood to assume responsibility. But there are additional justifications. Chief among these are the great increase in medical knowledge and the potentials for application of it to the medical care of children.

It continues to be our goal to provide in a single volume a synthesis of pediatric knowledge which will be appropriate for the student as an introduction to pediatrics and for the clinician as a useful and competent reference. For the assembly of the text material we are dependent upon the many contributors, the selection of whom constitutes one of the major responsibilities of editorship. It is the final synthesis and shaping of the contributed manuscripts into a text with some semblance of unity and balance in each section and in the book as a whole which constitute the sizable and painstaking task that one should be wise enough to avoid.

Into such a forbidding situation we welcome Drs. Vaughan and McKay. They were not chosen lightly, nor did they come in blindly. Each has been a major contributor to past editions and Dr. Vaughan has given much help with sections other than his own in several editions. Their strengths are well known to the editor. Each has a broad base in pediatrics, each has special interests which are complementary, and each is a competent and stimulating teacher. For the current edition they have shared in the general planning, in the selection of contributors and in editing. At least for the editor it has been a pleasant and an invigorating experience.

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No attempt will be made to delineate the changes in this edition; they are recorded and will be apparent in the Table of Contents. We have done our best with the help of the contributors to prepare a pediatric text which depicts the status and provides perspective of current knowledge in a usable manner. The task has been a tremendous one, and we can only hope that in some degree we have measured up. It is not difficult to be humble under such circumstances. There are new contributors for several of the major sections and for a larger number of the shorter ones. To both the old and new contributors we are indebted for the thoroughness with which they have covered their respective subjects and for their generosity in accepting the editing necessary to permit publication in a single volume and to provide a semblance of unity in literary style throughout.

As must be the case in a textbook such as this one, there are many unrecorded contributors who have helped in a variety of ways. Most of the members of our respective departments and many in other departments of our medical schools have provided assistance. It is not possible to acknowledge all of them, but we must give special credit to Drs. Richard Behrman, Mary Coté, Catharine Dacou, George Farrar, Joseph Garfunkel, Warren Grover, Doris Howell, Eleanor Hunt, Jerold Lucey, Demosthenes Pappagainis, Carol Phillipps, Charles Poser, Nancy Huang and J. Viswanathan.

To our publisher, the Saunders Company, we acknowledge not only our continuing indebtedness for their interest and care in providing a suitable format but also for the pleasure of working with them. We must here acknowledge the long and pleasant association of Mr. John Shaw in the editing of our book and wish him all the best in the retirement which he is now looking forward to.

Both J. P. Crozer Griffith and A. Graeme Mitchell died in 1941, shortly after publication of the 3rd edition.
