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PREFACE

This is the third edition of *Disorders of the Respiratory Tract in Children*. The objective of the third edition is the same as that of the two preceding editions: to provide an answer to almost any question about respiratory diseases in children raised by the practitioner, resident or intern in pediatrics, the chest physician, the roentgenologist, the medical student, or the family practitioner. However, there has been some modification in the approach. Consideration will be given to disorders involving the tonsils and adenoids, but this edition will be otherwise limited to disorders of the lower respiratory tract. There will be no volume on pediatric otolaryngology.

With this edition, Dr. Victor Chernick has become associate editor of *Disorders of the Respiratory Tract in Children*. There are twenty-one new contributors, and all chapters have been rewritten by new authors or revised and brought up to date. Particular note should be made of the expansion of chapters dealing with the fundamental basis of pulmonary pathology. There are seven new chapters: Diagnostic Pulmonary Radiology; Pulmonary Function Testing in the Office and Clinic; Antimicrobial Therapy; Drowning and Near-Drowning; Cor Pulmonale; Emphysema and Alpha₁-Antitrypsin Deficiency; and Nonasthmatic Allergic Pulmonary Disease.

The editors would like to express their appreciation to the contributors who have made this book possible. We are most grateful for their willingness, dedication, and expert attention to their assignment.

We should like to express our gratitude, too, to Dr. John Chapman, Dr. Louis Siltzbach, Dr. Donald Brummer, and Dr. Rosa Lee Nemir, who have generously read and criticized specific chapters of the book. Dr. Marc O. Beem has also contributed valuable advice.
