





May 1, 1937: a mass meeting at the village of Yun-yang, where I stopped on my way from Sian to Yenan. At lower left you can make out the red-starred caps of two Communist soldiers; in the foreground, the bound-footed women of the village; at right center are the uniformed children of the village school, backed by the banner-carrying men. By 1949 the Communists had won all China with meetings of this type: slogans, banners, and songs.
