### **FOREWORD**

In the twelfth edition of this long-established biographical reference work our aim was to produce a book much changed from its predecessors. A new research strategy has been introduced with the result that this volume has undergone a significant revision with the inclusion of many modern authors who had previously been omitted, together with the rationalization of existing entries.

Included in the twelfth edition are prominent living writers in all of the major genres, fiction, non-fiction, poetry and drama, together with top editors, journalists and columnists. Entrants are primarily those who write in English and who have had their material published in the U.K. or the U.S.A. but a feature of this particular edition is that it also includes those writers from non-English speaking countries whose work has received international acclaim.

A further notable aspect of this edition is that we have placed great emphasis on the inclusion of emerging authors who have risen to prominence since the publication of the previous edition. A wide variety of sources has been used to ensure that all such authors have been included and our computerised typesetting facilities have allowed us to feature even the most recently emerging literary figures. Within the book, therefore, you will find biographical information on modern writers which is almost impossible to locate elsewhere.

Strenuous efforts have been made to ensure the accuracy and comprehensive nature of the biographical details. Entries have been compiled mainly from questionnaires sent directly to the writers. After this initial compilation a proof of each entry has then been sent to the writer for review, correction and alteration to ensure the complete accuracy of the information before final inclusion. Entries of writers who have failed to respond to a questionnaire have been prepared from other sources and cross-checked for authenticity.

The format of the entries includes full biographical details which feature education, appointments and career, together with lists of major publications in date order, any literary honours, awards or prizes and details of membership to any societies. The layout is easy to read and allows for instant access to any part of this information through a series of italicised headings. Thus any entry can be scanned for the relevant information quickly, easily and effectively.

Also involved in the complete revision of the book has been the appendices section, with the introduction of two categories which have not appeared before. The first of these gives information on all major literary awards and prizes and also lists the winners of each during the last decade. The second is a pseudonym category which lists the pseudonyms of all writers who have been included in the biographical section. Existing appendices sections have all been totally updated to produce a refreshing new look to this part of the book.
