



Preface



The American legal scene has changed tremendously during the last quarter century and even more changes are expected as we approach the 21st century. As a result, the effect of the legal environment in which business operates has changed dramatically. THE LEGAL, ETHICAL AND INTERNATIONAL ENVIRONMENT OF BUSINESS, SECOND EDITION was written with two goals in mind—to present to the student the breadth of the legal, ethical and international environment of business and to provide a legal foundation that can be used in his or her business or government career.

To accomplish these goals, we have presented materials that cover both the private and public regulation of business. Legal topics discussed in the first area include contracts, sales, secured transactions, negotiable instruments, property, agency, partnerships, and corporations. Legal topics covered in the second area—public regulation—are labor law, securities law, antitrust, consumer rights, and environmental law. The second edition includes revised chapters on ethics and international law and integrates into all chapters both ethical and international considerations. The text integrates the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB) curriculum standards to cover ethical, global, political, social, legal, regulatory, environmental, and technological issues.

Total Learning/Teaching Package

This text constitutes what we believe to be a total learning/teaching package. It contains numerous pedagogical aids and high-interest additions.

Case Selection and Presentation

Each chapter has several cases to illustrate the application of the law to specific business problems. We have tried to create a balance between classic cases that are well recognized and recent cases that have changed the law significantly. Each case starts with the citation that includes the court, the date, the federal or state reporter (if available), and the West reporter. The Background and Facts focuses on the setting in which the case arose and identifies the plaintiffs and defendants. The actual court case is presented in an edited manner. Finally, the Decision and Remedy clearly states who won the case and why. When appropriate, we have a Comment section that presents additional material not available from the case itself or that indicates future trends.

Features of Each Chapter

Each chapter has an example of one or more of the following special sections that are designed to instruct as well as to interest the student.

Quotations

Each chapter opens with a brief quotation that is appropriate to the chapter material.

Exhibits

Most chapters have at least one exhibit to illustrate important aspects of the law. Some exhibits are charts, such as the one setting out the federal court system; others focus on classifications or summaries; and others set out forms used in the legal or business world, such as the one presenting a sample credit sale contract.

Legal Highlights

Nearly all chapters have legal highlights in which the student is presented with practical advice, such as how to check on a social security account, or with examples of how the law was applied in an unusual situation, such as the one on the crosscultural conflict on the Texas Gulf Coast.

Ethical Considerations

Disclosures of criminal activity by businesses shook the business world and public confidence. Old, established Wall Street brokerage houses were found guilty of securities law violations, the savings and loan institutions were destroyed by those who looted them, businesses were found guilty of criminal violations of environmental laws. As public confidence waned, businesses turned to incorporating ethics into their daily activities. The emphasis on ethics in academic studies is reflected in the standards set by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB). The new standards require that ethics be integrated into the study of business. This text likewise integrates ethics into each chapter. Chapter 2 covers ethical theories and provides a basis for class discussion of the ethical problems set out at the end of each chapter.

International Considerations

The economic future of the United States is dependent upon international trade. People involved with international business will need a working knowledge as to how international trade functions and the legal problems that may arise. The AACSB is also concerned with integrating global issues into the academic studies of business. Each chapter has an International Consideration that discusses international aspects of the chapter's subject matter. Chapter 24 covers various aspects of doing business in the global environment.

Facing a Legal Issue

Located at the end of each chapter is material entitled Facing a Legal Issue. In each discussion, we have attempted to present a factual situation which a business person could confront in his or her career. These situations concern problems that are collateral to the rest of the material contained within the chapter. They are an attempt to give students practical factual advice on how to apply the law.

Key Terms

Each chapter ends with a list of key terms first identified by bold-faced type in the text.

Questions and Case Problems

At the end of each chapter, five to ten Questions and Case problems are set out. The questions are a mix of hypotheticals and problems taken from actual cases for which full citations are given. Complete answers to all of the Questions and Case Problems are found in a separate booklet entitled Answers to Questions and Case Problems.




