### **PREFACE**

This publication complements Copyright Law: Seventh Edition by providing access to a variety of materials which we hope will be of use to students and teachers alike. Together, the Seventh Edition and this Supplement provide the most comprehensive, up-to-date materials on copyright available in legal education today.

Part One of the Supplement contains the Copyright Clause of the U.S Constitution, the current version of Title 17, and the Copyright Act of 1909, and miscellaneous legislative materials.

Part Four offers a variety of new text and case law materials. We have included opinions newly released or revised by the courts, as well as additional and substitutional text notes updating developments since publication of the Seventh Edition.

Finally, Part Five contains a Cumulative Bibliography of important secondary materials on copyright (and related bodies of law). It is organized to mirror the casebook chapter-by-chapter for maximum utility.

#### COPYRIGHT (AND PATENT) CLAUSE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

Article I, Section 8, Clause 8

The Congress shall have Power ... To promote the Progress of Science and useful Arts, by securing for limited Times to Authors and Inventors the exclusive Right to their respective Writings and Discoveries.
