Moreover, throughout the guide, there are discussions of the Sarbanes-Oxley Act of 2002, regarded as the most important piece of federal securities legislation since 1934.

The book also discusses state law, primarily to distinguish its role from that of federal law in the area of securities regulation. For example, the business judgment rule, which is a state law doctrine shielding directors and officers from liability in the conduct of ordinary corporate affairs, applies in certain contests regulated by the federal securities laws, such as takeovers and tender offers.

The discussion that follows identifies the principal provisions affecting officers and directors personally with respect to their corporate roles. This includes examination of key SEC mandates in the arena of corporate governance, for example. The guide also discusses proxies and corporate reporting, as well individual liability in connection with a company's securities offering, mergers and acquisitions. Also examined are the following topics: indemnification and D&O insurance; investment company directors; insider reporting under Exchange Act Section 16; and Regulation FD.
