



#### **Preface**

There is a growing interest in human rights among students, lawyers, teachers, diplomats and other professional groups, as well as the general public as a whole, and this has led Council of Europe Publishing to bring together in one volume a selection of the major international texts in this field, which can be used both as an introduction to the vast subject of human rights and as a working tool.

To celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the European Convention on Human Rights – the first international legal instrument to guarantee the protection of human rights – the first, 1992, edition has now been revised and updated.

The further development of human rights standards since 1992, both at universal and at regional levels – not least within the Council of Europe following the accession of most former communist countries – has made it necessary to prepare this new edition to reflect these advances. For the same reason, and in order to keep the overall size of this volume within reasonable bounds, the selection of texts to be included had to be even more rigorous than was already the case with the first edition. Apart from very few exceptions, only legally binding instruments are included.

Although it cannot be considered to embrace all international texts on the subject, it is hoped that this collection of basic texts in the field of human rights will provide all interested circles with a reference book capable of providing a maximum of relevant information in an objective and precise manner.
