Preface

Contemporary Authors (CA) provides information on approximately 100,000 writers in a wide range of media, including:

- Current writers of fiction, nonfiction, poetry, and drama whose works have been issued by commercial publishers, risk publishers, or university presses (authors whose books have been published only by known vanity or author-subsidized firms are ordinarily not included)
- Prominent print and broadcast journalists, editors, photojournalists, syndicated cartoonists, graphic novelists, screenwriters, television scriptwriters, and other media people
- Authors who write in languages other than English, provided their works have been published in the United States or translated into English
- Literary greats of the early twentieth century whose works are popular in today's high school and college curriculums and continue to elicit critical attention

A CA listing entails no charge or obligation. Authors are included on the basis of the above criteria and their interest to CA users. Sources of potential listees include trade periodicals, publisher's catalogs, librarians, and other users.

How to Get the Most out of CA: Use the Index

The key to locating an author's most recent entry is the CA cumulative index, which is published separately and distributed with even-numbered original volumes and odd-numbered revision volumes. It provides access to all entries in CA and Contemporary Authors New Revision Series (CANR). Always consult the latest index to find an author's most recent entry.

How Are Entries Compiled?

The editors make every effort to secure new information directly from the authors; listees' responses to our questionnaires and query letters provide most of the information featured in CA. For deceased writers, or those who fail to reply to requests for data, we consult other reliable biographical sources, such as those indexed in Gale's Biography and Genealogy Master Index, and bibliographical sources, including National Union Catalog, LC MARC, and British National Bibliography. Further details come from published interviews, feature stories, and book reviews, as well as information supplied by the authors' publishers and agents.

An asterisk (*) at the end of a sketch indicates that the listing has been compiled from secondary sources believed to be reliable but has not been personally verified for this edition by the author sketched.

What Kinds of Information Does an Entry Provide?

Sketches in CA contain the following biographical and bibliographical information:

- Entry heading: the most complete form of author's name, plus any pseudonyms or name variations used for writing
- Personal information: author's date and place of birth, family data, ethnicity, educational background, political and religious affiliations, and hobbies and leisure interests
- Addresses: author's home, office, or agent's addresses, plus e-mail and fax numbers, as available
- Career summary: name of employer, position, and dates held for each career post; resume of
 other vocational achievements; military service
- Membership information: professional, civic, and other association memberships and any
 official posts held
- Awards and honors: military and civic citations, major prizes and nominations, fellowships, grants, and honorary degrees
- Writings: a comprehensive, chronological list of titles, publishers, dates of original publication and revised editions, and production information for plays, television scripts, and screenplays
- Adaptations: a list of films, plays, and other media which have been adapted from the author's work
- Work in progress: current or planned projects, with dates of completion and/or publication, and expected publisher, when known
- **Sidelights:** a biographical portrait of the author's development; information about the critical reception of the author's works; revealing comments, often by the author, on personal interests, aspirations, motivations, and thoughts on writing
- Biographical and critical sources: a list of books and periodicals in which additional information on an author's life and/or writings appears

Obituary Notices in *CA* provide date and place of birth as well as death information about authors whose full-length sketches appeared in the series before their deaths. These entries also summarize the authors' careers and writings and list other sources of biographical and death information.

Related Titles in the CA Series

Contemporary Authors Autobiography Series complements CA original and revised volumes with specially commissioned autobiographical essays by important current authors, illustrated with personal photographs they provide. Common topics include their motivations for writing, the people and experiences that shaped their careers, the rewards they derive from their work, and their impressions of the current literary scene.

Contemporary Authors Bibliographical Series surveys writings by and about important American authors since World War II. Each volume concentrates on a specific genre and features approximately ten writers; entries list works written by and about the author and contain a bibliographical essay discussing the merits and deficiencies of major critical and scholarly studies in detail.

Available in Electronic Formats

CD-ROM. Full-text bio-bibliographic entries from the entire CA series, covering approximately 100,000 writers, are available on CD-ROM through lease and purchase plans. The disc combines entries from the CA, CANR, and Contemporary Authors Permanent Series (CAP) print series to provide the most recent author listing. It can be searched by name, title, subject/genre, nationality/ethnicity, personal data, and as well as advanced searching using boolean logic. The disc is updated every six months. A Sampling of Authors and Media People Featured in This Volume

Eric Alterman

Alterman is a respected liberal journalist. His first book, Sound and Fury: The Washington Punditocracy and the Collapse of American Politics, examines the effect that "celebrity" political commentators have on U.S. politics.

Louise Bennett

A legendary West Indian poet, writer, performer, and folklorist, Bennett has displayed skill with dialect verses, distinguishing her as both a noteworthy artist and as a champion of her rich culture.

Genrikh Borovik

Borovik is a Russian journalist who examines real-life espionage in his book *The Philby Files: The Secret Life of Master Spy Kim Philby*, which recounts the exploits of a British spy who sold secrets to the U.S.S.R.

Juan Bosch

Bosch is a prolific author of both fiction and nonfiction but is best known for his term as the president of the Dominican Republic. Among his translated works is *The Unfinished Experiment: Democracy in the Dominican Republic*.

Enrique Buenaventura

A dramatist with a strong political voice, Buenaventura seeks to restore political pride and independence to his native Columbia. His plays include the award-winning *Historia de una bala de plata* ("Tale of a Silver Bullet").

Driss Chraibi

Chraibi is an esteemed Moroccan novelist noted for his skill in evoking various aspects of his native culture. These qualities are especially evident in his first novel, *The Simple Past*.

Sue Coe

A noted author and illustrator, Coe is the creator of a number of graphic works with overt political themes, including X, a collaboration with legendary underground artist Art Spiegelman, the author of Maus.

Antonio Damasio

Damasio is a neurosurgeon who turned his attention to writing with 1994's *Descartes's Error: Emotion, Reason, and the Human Brain,* which seeks to explain the physiological motivation for aberrant behavior, cognition, and perception.

Robert Desnos

French poet Desnos is credited as a pioneer of the surrealist movement that swept French literature and arts during the 1920s. Considered an expert at the technique of automatic writing, his poems are collected in *The Voice*.

Kaye Gibbons

Gibbons is a novelist whose chronicles of southern life have earned her a good deal of respect among critics and readers alike. Her novels include *A Virtuous Woman* and the awardwinning *A Cure for Dreams*.

Tomson Highway

A Native American playwright, Highway is the recipient of numerous honors, including several Dora Mavor Moore Awards. He penned such esteemed works as *The Rez Sisters* and *Dry Lips Oughta Move to Kapuskasing*.

Peter Hoeg

Hoeg's 1993 novel, *Smilla's Sense of Snow*, an unconventional thriller set in Denmark, was a runaway bestseller. The novel has been translated into seventeen different languages and has been adapted as a film by director Bille August.

Nick Hornby

A British author of both fiction and nonfiction, Hornby is the author of a series of books that, superficially, deal with football (soccer in America), but more succinctly deal with the quirks of human nature.

Birney Imes

Imes is a distinguished photojournalist whose chronicles of the rural American South have earned him considerable acclaim. His collections include *Juke Joint: Photographs* and the much-lauded *Whispering Pines*.

Amy Lowell

Lowell was a strong proponent of poetry, working tirelessly to promote the genre among American readers. She also wrote a bit of verse herself (650 poems), collecting the Pulitzer Prize in 1926 for her collection *What's O'Clock*.

Dawn Steel

Steel is one of the most powerful women in Hollywood, having overseen such films as *Top Gun* and *The Untouchables*. She recounts her adventures in egocentric Hollywood in her book *They Can Kill You, But They Can't Eat You*.

OBITUARY NOTICE—See index for CA sketch: Born in 1924, in Philadelphia, PA; died following a heart attack, March 24, 1996, in Menton, France. Author, screenwriter and editor. Marvin H. Albert was the author of more than 100 books written in several genres, including Westerns, mysteries, biographies, and novels. Many of his crime novels were published under various pseudonyms. During World War II, Albert served as a radio officer with the Merchant

Marine. He moved to New York in 1950 and found a job as a writer and editor, working on Look magazine. Albert's first major success was the western The Law and Jake Wade (1956). In 1965, he left for the west coast, settling in Hollywood, and began adapting his novels for film. He turned Apache Rising (1957) into Duel at Diablo, starring Sidney Poitier, and Miami Mayhem (1961) became Tony Rome, a vehicle for Frank Sinatra. In 1976 he won the Mystery Writers of America Edgar Award for his novel, The Gargoyle Conspiracy. That same year Albert relocated to France, where he started a series of crime novels set in the country featuring a French-American detective. His most recent work was a mystery titled Scarlet Women (1996).

I was a combat infantryman during World War II, fighting my way up the peninsula from just north of Naples to the Brenner Pass.

"My memoir See Naples was meant to exorcise the past. I am of a fair age and wanted to deal with past loves and with my early acquaintance with death during the war years. I wrote the book over a year or so on yellow sheets of paper, then transferred it to a computer upon the urging of my younger son. The novel I am writing now will be cast in the three countries I know best—the United States, France, and Italy—and will be about a father and his three sons—all bastards."

ALLEN, Richard (Hugh Sedley) 1903-1996

OBITUARY NOTICE—See index for CA sketch: Born February 3, 1903, in England; died January 16, 1996. Diplomat, educator, author. Allen devoted some thirty-five years to the British Diplomatic Service. He began his career as a junior assistant secretary with the Government of Palestine in Jerusalem in 1925. In

1927, he joined the British Diplomatic Service and for the next twenty-seven years, served posts in Tokyo, Prague, Berne, Santiago, Bogota, Warsaw, and Buenos Aires. After two years (1954 to 1956) as British Minister to Guatemala, he served as British ambassador to Burma until 1962. Upon retirement from the British Diplomatic Service, he lectured at universities in the United States, many along the Western Coast. These included University of Washington, Whitman College, Central Washington State College, and University of California, Los Angeles. He was named Knight Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George in 1960. His books include The Task of Western Diplomacy in Southeast Asia, Malaysia-Prospect and Retrospect: The Impact and Aftermath of Colonial Rule, A Short Introduction to the History and Politics of Southeast Asia, and Imperialism and Nationalism in the Fertile Crescent: Sources and Prospects of the Arab-Israeli Conflict.

ALLSOBROOK, David Ian 1940-

SIDELIGHTS: David Ian Allsobrook is a scholar who specializes in the Victorian era in England. In his first book, 1986's Schools for the Shires: The Reform of Middle-Class Education in Mid-Victorian England, Allsobrook uncovered little-studied records of the Taunton Commission, which was charged with investigating England's schools for children of the middle class in 1864. The author is credited with enriching the understanding of the formative influences on the British public school system and on the rise of the middle class. In his 1991 volume, Liszt: My Travelling Circus Life, Allsobrook documents a little known period in the life of virtuoso pianist and composer, Franz Liszt, during which Liszt travelled through the English countryside with a troupe of musicians. The author's portrayal of the rigors of travelling and of the level of musical culture in Victorian England are considered important additions to the literature in this area.

In Schools for the Shires, Allsobrook provides a detailed account of the historical context, findings, and impact of the mid-nineteenth-century education reform movement in England. The author focuses on one of the royal education commissions charged with the responsibility of investigating England's secondary school system. The commission, known as the Schools Inquiry or Taunton Commission (named for the peer, Baron Taunton, who led the commission), examined the schools available to England's middle class to determine the ways in which they could be reformed. Though neither its report nor its recommendations was fully implemented, Allsobrook traces their impact to the formation of Britain's national schools in the early twentieth century. Critics noted

that one of Allsobrook's most important contributions to Victorian history is his discovery that the impetus for reform came from within the country's wealthy rural class, rather than, as historians had previously assumed, from within its burgeoning urban middle class.

Critical response to Schools for the Shires was generally positive. Allsobrook is considered to have made a significant contribution to the history of education and of the middle class in England's Victorian era. And, he does so, according to Ian Britain's assessment in Victorian Studies, in a way that "is certainly not devoid of liveliness, inspiration, and judicious historical and literary instincts." Britain notes, however, that what he characterizes as the "riches" of Allsobrook's narrative, including "fresh and revealing quotations from Victorian observers" and "arresting, even quite provocative, observations of its own," are at times obscured by the author's method, which, Britain contends, casts these gems as "more often incidental than integral" to his main themes. Although Deborah Gorham of the American Historical Review faulted what she perceived as Allsobrook's unconsidered acceptance of the exclusion of middle-class girls from Victorian educational facilities of all castes, ignoring what literature is available on the education of girls at the time, she concluded: "With the exception of that omission, however, this is a thoroughly researched, thoughtful book that makes an important contribution to the history of Victorian education."

In Liszt: My Travelling Circus Life, Allsobrook provides an account of the Hungarian composer's four tours of England during 1840 and 1841. Liszt is believed to have made these tours in an attempt to earn enough money to allow him to devote himself exclusively to composition. Critics noted Allsobrook's portrait of the difficulties of travelling and of the cultural level of the audiences of the English provinces in the 1840s. Allsobrook's sources, including the diaries of John Orlando Parry, a comedic singer and popular member of the musical troupe that travelled with Liszt, and Liszt's own correspondence, as well as contemporary reviews of individual performances, are well utilized, according to some reviewers. Parry's journals "provide an especially flavorful account of the tours," Charles Suttoni remarked in the Music Library Association. "Allsobrook makes excellent use of his sources, turning up some captivating details," averred Jonathan Keates in the Times Literary Supplement. Although others expressed displeasure with what Choice reviewer E. Gaub called "a welter of digressions, speculations, and trivial details," many critics agreed with Suttoni, who declared: "Liszt's excursion into the British byways remains a most engaging episode, and Allsobrook's pleasantly handled retelling of it can be recommended."

Allsobrook told CA: "Music for Wales: Walford Davies and the National Council of Music, 1918-41, is an account of the work of Sir Walford Davies, Master of the King's Musick, in leading the activities of the Welsh National Council of Music, a body established by the University of Wales, and supported by munificent philanthropy in the inter-War years. Davies's aim was nothing less than to transform musical taste and accomplishment in the Principality of Wales; in particular, to encourage the development of music education in the schools and of instrumental skills in what was traditionally considered to be a 'singing' people."
