These changes are mirrored in the substantive alterations in content of this, the third edition. For instance, the effects of the "sexual revolution" and the social and behavioral changes accompanying it are illustrated by the need for separate chapters devoted to chlamydia, herpesvirus, papillomavirus, and the human immunodeficiency virus. As primary care physicians to many women, obstetricians and gynecologists find themselves in the forefront of the challenge presented by breast disease; thus, two chapters on that vital topic have been added.
