Preface

Contemporary Authors (CA) provides information on approximately 100,000 writers in a wide range of media, including:

- Current writers of fiction, nonfiction, poetry, and drama whose works have been issued by commercial
 publishers, risk publishers, or university presses (authors whose books have been published only by
 known vanity or author-subsidized firms are ordinarily not included)
- Prominent print and broadcast journalists, editors, photojournalists, syndicated cartoonists, graphic novelists, screenwriters, television scriptwriters, and other media people
- Authors who write in languages other than English, provided their works have been published in the United States or translated into English
- Literary greats of the early twentieth century whose works are popular in todays high school and college curriculums and continue to elicit critical attention


A CA listing entails no charge or obligation. Authors are included on the basis of the above criteria and their interest to CA users. Sources of potential listees include trade periodicals, publishers' catalogs, librarians, and other users.

How to Get the Most out of CA: Use the Index

The key to locating an author's most recent entry is the CA cumulative index, which is published separately and distributed twice a year. It provides access to all entries in CA and Contemporary Authors New Revision Series (CANR). Always consult the latest index to find an authors most recent entry.

How Are Entries Compiled?

The editors make every effort to secure new information directly from the authors; listees' responses to our question-naires and query letters provide most of the information featured in CA. For deceased writers, or those who fail to reply to requests for data, we consult other reliable biographical sources, such as those indexed in Gale's Biography and Genealogy Master Index, and bibliographical sources, including National Union Catalog, LC MARC, and British National Bibliography. Further details come from published interviews, feature stories, and book reviews, as well as information supplied by the authors' publishers and agents.

An asterisk (*) at the end of a sketch indicates that the listing has been compiled from secondary sources believed to be reliable but has not been personally verified for this edition by the author sketched.

What Kinds of Information Does An Entry Provide?

Sketches in CA contain the following biographical and bibliographical information:

- Entry heading: the most complete form of author's name, plus any pseudonyms or name variations used for writing
- **Personal information:** author's date and place of birth, family data, ethnicity, educational background, political and religious affiliations, and hobbies and leisure interests
 - · Addresses: author's home, office, or agent's addresses, plus e-mail and fax numbers, as available
- Career summary: name of employer, position, and dates held for each career post; resume of other vocational achievements; military service
 - Membership information: professional, civic, and other association memberships and any official posts held
- Awards and honors: military and civic citations, major prizes and nominations, fellowships, grants, and honorary degrees
- Writings: a comprehensive, chronological list of titles, publishers, dates of original publication and revised editions, and production information for plays, television scripts, and screenplays
 - Adaptations: a list of films, plays, and other media which have been adapted from the author's work
- Work in progress: current or planned projects, with dates of completion and/or publication, and expected publisher, when known
- **Sidelights:** a biographical portrait of the author's development; information about the critical reception of the author's works; revealing comments, often by the author, on personal interests, aspirations, motivations, and thoughts on writing
- Interview: a one-on-one discussion with authors conducted especially for CA, offering insight into authors' thoughts about their craft
- Autobiographical Essay: an original essay written by noted authors for CA, a forum in which writers may present themselves, on their own terms, to their audience
 - **Photographs:** portraits and personal photographs of notable authors

• Biographical and critical sources: a list of books and periodicals in which additional information on an author's life and/or writings appears

Obituary Notices in *CA* provide date and place of birth as well as death information about authors whose full-length sketches appeared in the series before their deaths. The entries also summarize the authors' careers and writings and list other sources of biographical and detah information.

Related Titles in the CA Series

Contemporary Authors Autobiography Series complements CA original and revised volumes with specially commissioned autobiographical essays by important current authors, illustrated with personal photographs they provide. Common topics include their motivations for writing, the people and experiences that shaped their careers, the rewards they derive from their work, and their impressions of the current literary scene.

Contemporary Authors Bibliographical Series surveys writings by and about important American authors since World War II. Each volume concentrates on a specific genre and features approximately ten writers; entries list works written by and about the author and contain a bibliographical essay discussing the merits and deficiencies of major critical and scholarly studies in detail.

Available in Electronic Formats

CD-ROM. Full-text bio-bibliographic entries from the entire *CA* series, covering approximately 100,000 writers, are available on CD-ROM through lease and purchase plans. The disc combines entries from the *CA*, *CANR*, and *Contemporary Authors Permanent Series* (*CAP*) print series to provide the most recent author listing. The *CA CD-ROM* is searchable by name, title, subject/genre, nationality/ethnicity, personal data, and as well as by using Boolean logic. The disc is updated every six months. Online. The *Contemporary Authors* database is made available online to libraries and their patrons through online public access catalog (OPAC) vendors. Currently, *CA* is offered through Ameritech Library Services' Vista Online (formerly Dynix).

A Sampling of Authors and Media People Featured in This Volume

Bernardo Dominguez Alba

A Panamanian author, educator, and diplomat, Alba wrote poetry, short stories, and novels known for their innovative blending of Panamanian heritage, German expressionism, French cubism, and Italian futurism.

Sven Birkerts

A literary critic and author, Birkerts developed his analytical skills through voracious reading. His titles include *The Gutenberg Elegies*, in which he laments the demise of the book in the electronic age. In an autobiographical essay written for *CA*, Birkerts discusses the influence of family and culture on his life as a writer.

Myriam Chancy

Chancy, a Canadian author born in Haiti, has authored such works as Searching for Safe Spaces: Afro-Caribbean Women Writers in Exile and Framing Silence: Revolutionary Novels by Haitian Women, both of which explore the theme of "Afro-Caribbean diasporic feminism."

Edward Field

Field's poetry, known for its openness and innocence, has generated both positive and mixed reviews. His work include A Full Heart, for which he was nominated for the Lenore Marshall Poetry Prize. In an autobiographical essay written for CA, Field asserts that his poetry "speaks to ordinary people, aims for common ground."

Eddie Little

Little drew from his own experience as a convicted criminal to produce his 1998 debut novel *Another Day in Paradise*. The first person narrative, which depicts the downward spiral of a teenager, has been adapted to a film starring James Woods and Melanie Griffith.

Andrei Makine

Russian native Makine is the author of *Le Testament Français*, winner of 1995 Prix Goncourt and Prix Medicis awards. The autobiographical novel, concerned with the migration of a character into a foreign culture, reflects the author's own departure from Russia to live in France.

Anna Michener

Michener delved into her own troubled past to produce the memoir *Becoming Anna: The Autobiography of a Sixteen-Year-Old.* Published in 1998, the volume describes scenes of physical and emotional abuse at the hands of the author's parents and grandmother as well as hospitalization in a mental facility.

Leopoldo Panero

Panero was a Spanish poet who published verse during the Spanish Civil War, an era when literary experimentation in that country was considered risky. His volume *Escrito a Cada Instante* won a Fastenrath Prize from the Spanish Royal Academy and a Premio Nacional de Literatura award.

Norma B. Rickerts

Ricketts has written several historical works related to Mormon activities in the American West during the nineteenth century, including *Mormon Battalion: U.S. Army of the West, 1846-1848*. Arranged as a daily journal, *Mormon Battalion* utilizes the accounts of several participants in the Mormon westward march.

S. L. Rottman

An award-winning writer of young adult fiction, Rottman is the author of *Hero*, a novel about a young man's transformation from an isolated troublemaker to a more caring individual who is capable of both helping others and being helped.

Mary C. Smith

A U.S. foreign service officer for twenty-two years, Smith drew upon her experience to write *The Undesirables*, an award-winning science fiction novel that details a corrupt twenty-second-century government.

Serge Patrice Thibodeau

Thibodeau, a French-Canadian poet, produces works which encompass a wandering motif and are inspired by Islamic religion and his travels through southwest Asia and the Middle East.

OBITUARY NOTICE—See index for CA sketch: Born January 5, 1915, in Canton, OH; died August 18, 1994, in Santa Barbara, CA. Psychotherapist. Abt received his B.S. degree in 1936 and his Ph.D. in 1947 from New York University, and his M.A. degree in 1939 from Columbia University. He served in the U.S. Naval Reserve from 1942 to 1946, attaining the rank of lieutenant commander. Abt began his career as a psychotherapist in private practice, in Larchmont and New York City, in 1939, retiring in 1980. He was also a consultant to the Veterans Administration from 1946 to 1964. He was a fellow of both the American Psychological Association and the American Orthopsychiatric Association, and a member of Sigma Xi. His first book, which he wrote with Leopold Bellak, was Projective Psychology (1950). He later wrote or co-wrote Progress in Clinical Psychology, Acting Out, The Creative Experience, Children of Separation and Divorce, Interracial Marriage, Essays in Creativity, The Creative Expression, Social Psychology and Discretionary Law, and The New Therapies.

SIDELIGHTS: Considered by some literary critics to be most important Panamanian author of the twentieth century, Bernardo Dominguez Alba, who was known by his pseudonym, Rogelio Sinan, devoted his life to promoting the cause of literature in his native land. As a writer, Sinan was widely known for his works of poetry and his short stories, as well as for two exceptional, award-winning novels. His countrymen also recognize him for his contributions as a public servant and an educator. In addition to having served as the director for the National Department of Culture in Panama's Ministry of Education, Sinan was also a diplomat, serving his country in both Mexico and India. In addition to these duties, Sinan taught both literature and theater at some of Brazil's most distinguished universities. His writing bloomed and matured during a time when the vanguard movement was sweeping through Panamanian literary

circles during the 1920s and 1930s, and that movement's influence is evident in his work.

A world traveler, Sinan was exposed to a range of styles, including German expressionism, French cubism, and Italian futurism. Together with his deep understanding and appreciation for his Panamanian heritage, Sinan melded these traits and developed a distinct style that has profoundly influenced a new generation of writers in Panama. His unique voice became evident with the publication of Onda ("Wave"), his first volume of poetry, in 1929, a work that some critics point to as Panamanian literature's break with modernism. In addition to this work, some of Sinan's more renowned collections of poetry include Incendios ("Fires"), Semana santa en la niebla ("Holy Week in the Cloud"), and Saloma sin Salomar (title means "Saloma without Salomar"), all containing inventive language and creative structure. Many critics believe Sinan's prose was even more innovative, as he employed narrative techniques such as inner monologue and stream-ofconsciousness, as well as creating surrealistic scenes and dream sequences, that demand much of the reader.

Born on the lush island of Taboga, which is just off of the mainland, Sinan was imbued with the importance of nature in the Panamanian psyche. His stories reflect this importance, as they are filled with vivid images of the country's physical landscape. "Rogelio Sinan," asserted Dictionary of Literary Biography contributor Maida Watson Espener, "has always believed that universal values in literature must spring from a thorough knowledge of the writer's own national reality. His poetry, fiction, and drama are permeated with a sense of Panama's history, landscape, and racial relations." Yet, being a diplomat who had come to know his country from both a native and foreign perspective, Sinan had a deep understanding of Panama's social and political landscapes as well. His works are especially critical of oppressive foreign influences, as well as the country's upper class, both of which he usually symbolizes as being from the white, or lighter race. The heroes of his stories are usually of a darker skin color, symbolizing the indigenous native. Though Sinan never makes specific mention of it, the island of Taboga plays a significant role in some of his works, particularly in La isla magica, his most praised novel. The exotic island setting, separated from the rest of the world, is an allusion to a time before colonialism and the invasion of foreign influences. A complex work, La isla magica is also important because it signifies Sinan's divergence into magical realism.

Sinan's peers recognized his literary achievements, as he collected a host of awards for his work. *Plenilunio, La isla magica,* and *Semana santa en la niebla* all were awarded the prestigious Ricardo Miro National Literature Prize, Panama's highest literary prize, and Sinan also won many other awards. His crowning moment may have come in 1988 when the Panamanian government bestowed upon him several medals, as he received national homage for his fiction and his endless promotion of the art. Sinan was, according to Espener, "not only . . . an innovative writer but . . . a teacher and mentor to numerous writers during his many decades as the undisputed leader of the country's literary circles."
