Introduction

A dictionary of synonyms and antonyms contains lists of words that have a similar meaning to another word. It can help you to express yourself more clearly, find a word that is on the tip of your tongue, or avoid repeating a word that you have already used. It can also be a very useful resource for crossword puzzles and other word games.

Extra help is provided by the boxed Word Links—words related in different ways to a selection of key entries. Under **bird**, for example, you will find the words **avian** (meaning 'relating to birds') and **ornithology** (meaning 'the study of birds').

New to this Third Edition are words such as podcast, staycation, redact, chilled,

coruscating, nemesis, and disruptive (in the sense of 'innovative').

In addition, there is a useful centre section designed to improve your knowledge of the English language even further: a supplement of commonly confused words explains the crucial differences between similar words that are often mixed up, and a Wordfinder section offers more sources of vocabulary in the form of thematic lists—from chemical elements and clothing to phobias and flowers.

Labels

Most of the synonyms in this dictionary are part of standard English, but some are used only in certain contexts or types of writing. These are grouped at the end of their sense, preceded by one of the following labels, as appropriate:

informal normally used only in speech or informal writing or email (e.g. barmy or gawp) formal normally used only in writing, especially in official documents (e.g. dwelling)

dated no longer used by most people (e.g. navvy)

old use not in ordinary use today, though sometimes used to give an old-fashioned effect

(e.g. comely)

historical only used today to refer to things that are no longer part of modern life (e.g. alms) literary found only or mainly in works of literature (e.g. plenteous)

technical: normally used only in technical language (e.g. occlude)

derogatory meant to convey a low opinion or to insult someone (e.g. pleb)

Geographical labels

English is spoken throughout the world, and while most of the words used in standard British English are also used in other varieties, there are some words which are only found in one type of English. If a word has the geographical label *Brit*: in this dictionary, this means that it is used in standard British English but not in American English, although it may be found in other varieties such as Australian English. The labels *US* and *N. Amer.*, on the other hand, mean that the word is typically American and is not standard in British English, though it may be found elsewhere.

Subject labels

These are used to show that a word or sense is connected with a particular subject or specialist activity such as *Medicine* or *Computing*.
