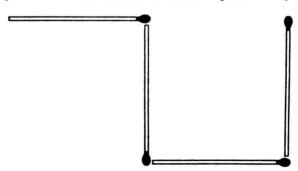

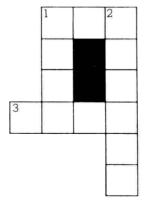

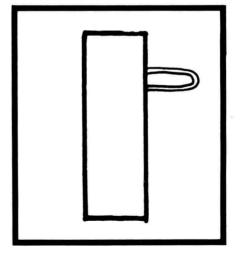

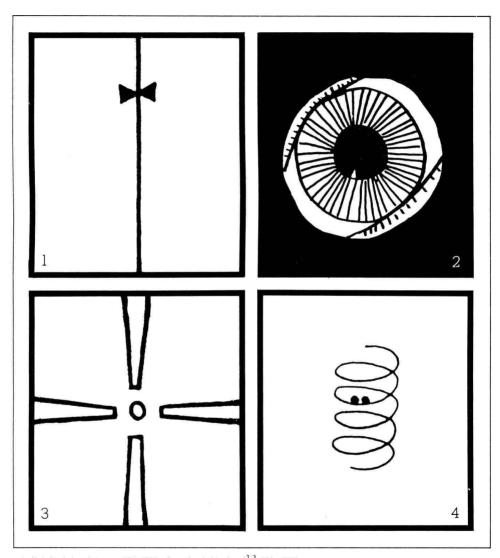
DROODLES
