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Unit I The Nurse: Foundations for Nursing Practice

The four chapters which comprise Unit I introduce the concepts of professional nursing, health-illness, and the health care system in society. The learner explores what it means to be an emerging profession and nursing's role as a provider of care. An introduction to nursing theory is given in chapter four; chapters five and six provide a basis for understanding ethical and legal implications of nursing actions and relationships.

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Chapter 1 Introduction to Nursing

Chapter 1 of Fundamentals of Nursing (Taylor, 1988) introduces the learner to the historical context of the emerging profession of nursing. The organizational structure of the profession, educational preparation, and contemporary roles of nursing are presented. After studying this chapter and completing the associated workbook exercises the student should be able to

- Describe the historical background, the definitions, and the professional status of nursing.
- Identify the aims of nursing, including nursing activities necessary to promote wellness and prevent illness.
- · Describe the various levels of educational preparation and offerings in nursing.

- Identify current trends and issues in nursing.



Chapter 2 Promoting Wellness in Health and Illness
