Preface

wrote this book to provide paralegal students and professors with a text that is truly written for them. This book will help paralegals improve their attorneys' practices by focusing on the paralegal's role, from interviewing clients and witnesses to investigating cases through formal discovery and informal processes. Each chapter will discuss the complex law of evidence in language that nonlawyers can understand, without sacrificing important coverage. This book will be useful to paralegal and criminal justice students, and anyone else who wants to learn the basics of finding evidence and getting it admitted into or excluded from court.

FOLLOW A CASE FROM START TO FINISH

Evidence: Investigation, Rules, and Trials follows the path of a case from initial client interview through investigation, trial, and appeal. After an introduction to evidence, the text covers informal investigations, including interviewing the client and witnesses. Next we examine the formal discovery process and introduce the courts and evidence rules. Then we can dive into the rules of evidence, starting with relevance. Hearsay, exceptions to hearsay, and opinion testimony follow. Next we cover pretrial matters such as motions in limine and preparing a trial notebook. The penultimate chapter concerns trials, and finally we look at the future of evidence.

Discussions and examples from criminal practice are included where appropriate throughout this text.

I hope you find this book to be practical, not overly technical in explaining the concepts, thorough but not too complex, and as much fun to read as an author can make a textbook on his favorite subject. Wherever possible, I tried to utilize an example that would prove interesting.

FEATURES

Evidence does not exist in a vacuum. I wrote this text to show how evidence is analyzed in the context of the case it supports. To create that context, this text uses a recurring feature called *Passim Case*, a fictional civil case involving identity theft. In *Fields v. Prairie Bank*, students will learn to apply otherwise abstract concepts to a concrete case, while considering which evidence is admissible and completing projects related to the burgeoning problem of identity theft.

When something is cited throughout a legal document it can be referred to in an index as "Passim." Throughout the text you will be learning about evidence by looking at a fictional case. It will help you understand the concepts involved in gathering evidence and evaluating its admissibility. That way you will not need to learn these things in a vacuum. You will read an overview of the case and learn more about it in each chapter.

Bench Briefs appear liberally throughout the text to continue building a real-life framework for the law of evidence. Bench Briefs include documents and transcripts from real cases, examples from real-life experience, ethics alerts, and relevant excerpts from movies, television, and novels.

MONA LISA VITO: 'Cause Chevy didn't make a 327 in '55, the 327 didn't come out till '63. And it wasn't offered in the Bel Air with a four-barrel carb till '64. However, in 1964, the correct ignition timing would be four degrees before top-dead-center.

D.A. JIMTROTTER: Well ... uh ... she's acceptable, Your Honor.

Ind-of-Chapter Assignments provide opportunities for review and further study. There are review questions and projects as well as legal research projects. Most paralegal students will study legal research in a separate course. To complement that learning, this text offers end-of-chapter opportunities for students to practice their legal research skills at varying levels of difficulty. Students may perform book or Internet research to complete such easy tasks as locating a case by citation and briefing it, medium difficulty tasks such as locating sample interrogatories or a form, and more difficult research tasks such as original legal research and writing a memo.
