

### **PREFACE**

VOLUME III has grown out of Part Seven of the first and second editions of *International Law as Applied by International Courts and Tribunals*. It is concerned with the Fundamentals of the Law of International Institutions and the quasi-constitutional framework of contemporary world society: the United Nations and its Related Inter-Governmental Agencies. In a non-technical sense, which will require clarification, these contents have provided the title of Volume III: *International Constitutional Law*.

The volume is addressed to five groups of readers: academic teachers and postgraduate students specialising in the disciplines of International Organisation, International Institutions and the Law of International Institutions or what, in his comprehensive and stimulating work, Professor Schermers terms International Institutional Law; legal practitioners in foreign ministries; members of the secretariats of, and delegations to, international institutions, as well as those of 40,000 staff members of the United Nations and its Related Inter-Governmental Agencies who may find it necessary to invoke the jurisdiction of any of the administrative tribunals concerned. Finally, it may assist students of international law who prefer to find their bearings in international law from law-determining agencies which. at least relatively, are more immune than others from the impact of vested national and international interests, eristic ideologies and the emanations of "committed" and. therefore, self-neutralising scholarship.

At one time or another during the preparation of this volume, I have received invaluable assistance—academic, critical, editorial and technical—from a number of friends and colleagues: E. D. Brown, Bin Cheng, Margaret Homewood, Hilde Jacobi, Gunhild Mueller, Maryam Shadab and Gwyneth Williamson. To all of them I owe a considerable debt of gratitude.
