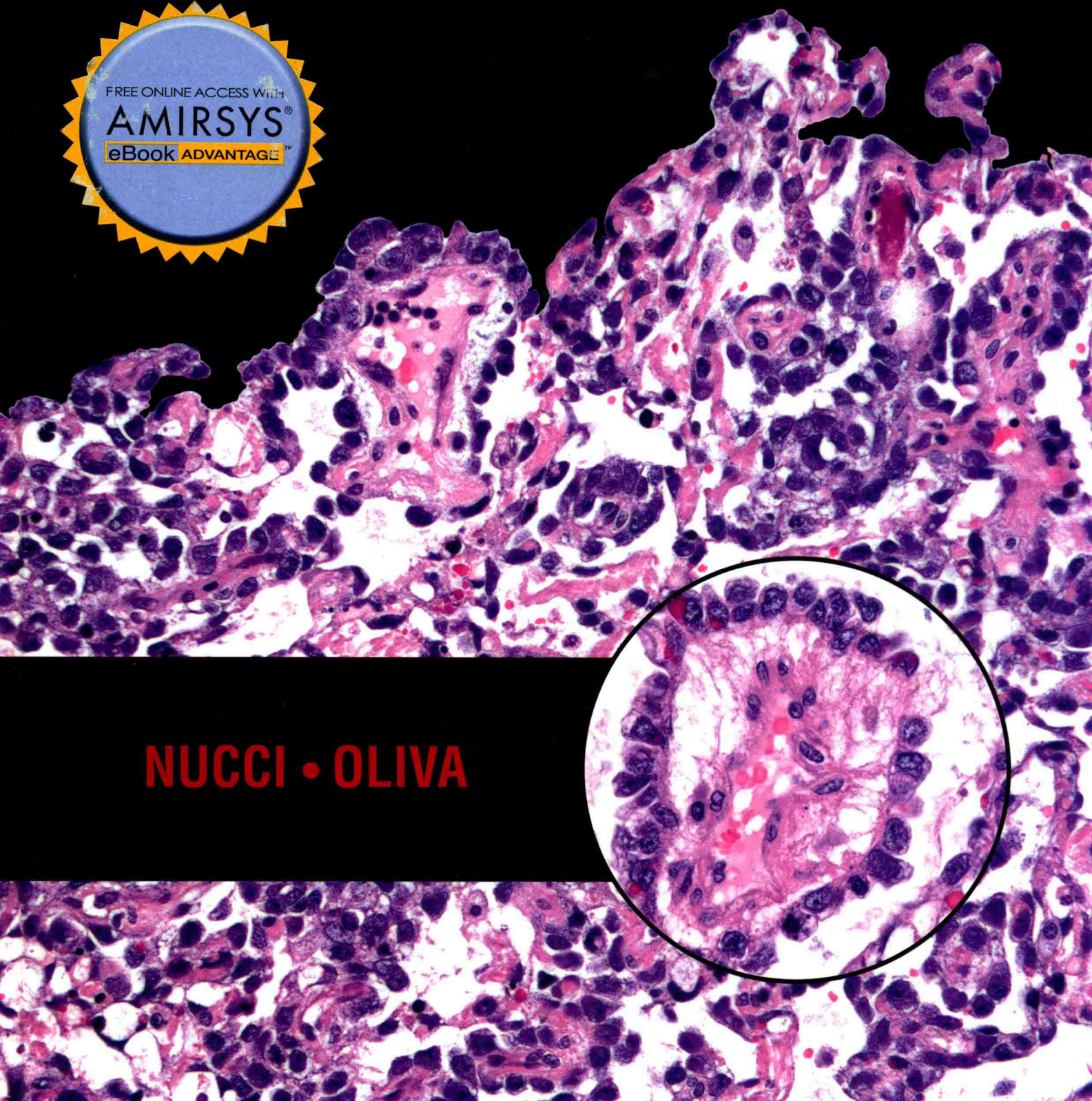
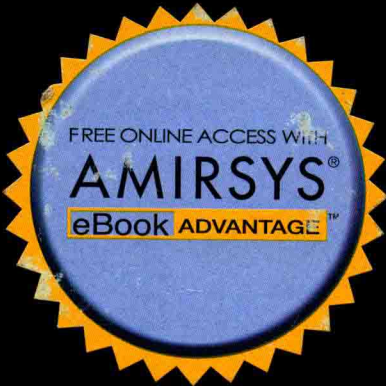

PREFACE

Diagnostic Pathology: Gynecological offers comprehensive up-to-date coverage of nonneoplastic and neoplastic conditions of the female genital tract in an easy-to-use format. This book is organized in a bulleted manner, making the text clear and crisp; it is also highly detailed, with coverage of common and uncommon entities. Moreover, it contains superior images, including gross and microscopic pathology, depicting both classic and variant morphologic findings as well as diagnostically relevant immunohistochemical findings. Each chapter also contains a key facts box, which represents a unique component of all *Diagnostic Pathology* textbooks, and offers quick reference to important clinical, gross, microscopic, immunohistochemical, &/or molecular features of each topic covered. Additionally, at the end of each chapter, there is a listing of one or more pathologic diagnostic pearls providing practical summary information.

This book is organized into six sections: Vulva, vagina, uterus, ovary, fallopian tube and broad ligament, and peritoneum. In addition to usually encountered conditions, this book also extensively covers uncommonly discussed topics such as inflammatory diseases of the vulva by experts in the field of dermatopathology. The reader will also find new information on the classification of squamous lesions of the lower female genital tract and uterine mesenchymal neoplasms. This volume is intended to be a concise, user friendly, superior diagnostic textbook for the busy practicing pathologist as well as pathology residents and fellows in training, and we very much hope that it will be useful to them.
