Contemporary Authors (CA) provides information on approximately 100,000 writers in a wide range of media, including:

- Current writers of fiction, nonfiction, poetry, and drama whose works have been issued by commercial publishers, risk publishers, or university presses (authors whose books have been published only by known vanity or author-subsidized firms are ordinarily not included)
- Prominent print and broadcast journalists, editors, photojournalists, syndicated cartoonists, graphic novelists, screenwriters, television scriptwriters, and other media people
- Authors who write in languages other than English, provided their works have been published in the United States or translated into English
- Literary greats of the early twentieth century whose works are popular in today's high school and college curriculums and continue to elicit critical attention


A CA listing entails no charge or obligation. Authors are included on the basis of the above criteria and their interest to CA users. Sources of potential listees include trade periodicals, publisher's catalogs, librarians, and other users.

How to Get the Most out of CA: Use the Index

The key to locating an author's most recent entry is the CA cumulative index, which is published separately and distributed with even-numbered original volumes and odd-numbered revision volumes. It provides access to all entries in CA and Contemporary Authors New Revision Series (CANR). Always consult the latest index to find an author's most recent entry.

How Are Entries Compiled?

The editors make every effort to secure new information directly from the authors; listees' responses to our questionnaires and query letters provide most of the information featured in CA. For deceased writers, or those who fail to reply to requests for data, we consult other reliable biographical sources, such as those indexed in Gale's Biography and Genealogy Master Index, and bibliographical sources, including National Union Catalog, LC MARC, and British National Bibliography. Further details come from published interviews, feature stories, and book reviews, as well as information supplied by the authors' publishers and agents.

An asterisk (*) at the end of a sketch indicates that the listing has been compiled from secondary sources believed to be reliable but has not been personally verified for this edition by the author sketched.

What Kinds of Information Does an Entry Provide?

Sketches in CA contain the following biographical and bibliographical information:

- Entry heading: the most complete form of author's name, plus any pseudonyms or name variations used for writing
- Personal information: author's date and place of birth, family data, ethnicity, educational background, political and religious affiliations, and hobbies and leisure interests
- Addresses: author's home, office, or agent's addresses, plus e-mail and fax numbers, as available
- Career summary: name of employer, position, and dates held for each career post; resume of other vocational achievements; military service
- Membership information: professional, civic, and other association memberships and any
 official posts held
- Awards and honors: military and civic citations, major prizes and nominations, fellowships, grants, and honorary degrees
- Writings: a comprehensive, chronological list of titles, publishers, dates of original publication and revised editions, and production information for plays, television scripts, and screenplays
- Adaptations: a list of films, plays, and other media which have been adapted from the author's work
- Work in progress: current or planned projects, with dates of completion and/or publication, and expected publisher, when known
- **Sidelights:** a biographical portrait of the author's development; information about the critical reception of the author's works; revealing comments, often by the author, on personal interests, aspirations, motivations, and thoughts on writing
- Biographical and critical sources: a list of books and periodicals in which additional information on an author's life and/or writings appears

Obituary Notices in *CA* provide date and place of birth as well as death information about authors whose full-length sketches appeared in the series before their deaths. These entries also summarize the authors' careers and writings and list other sources of biographical and death information.

Related Titles in the CA Series

Contemporary Authors Autobiography Series complements CA original and revised volumes with specially commissioned autobiographical essays by important current authors, illustrated with personal photographs they provide. Common topics include their motivations for writing, the people and experiences that shaped their careers, the rewards they derive from their work, and their impressions of the current literary scene.

Contemporary Authors Bibliographical Series surveys writings by and about important American authors since World War II. Each volume concentrates on a specific genre and features approximately ten writers; entries list works written by and about the author and contain a bibliographical essay discussing the merits and deficiencies of major critical and scholarly studies in detail.

CD-ROM. Full-text bio-bibliographic entries from the entire *CA* series, covering approximately 100,000 writers, are available on CD-ROM through lease and purchase plans. The disc combines entries from the *CA*, *CANR*, and *Contemporary Authors Permanent Series* (*CAP*) print series to provide the most recent author listing. It can be searched by name, title, subject/genre, personal data, and by using boolean logic. The disc is updated every six months. For more information, call 1-800-877-GALE.

A Sampling of Authors and Media People Featured in This Volume

Stanislaw Baranczak

A prominent Polish poet and translator, Baranczak was associated with the so-called "1968 Generation," which used poetry as a form of protest against the conditions in Poland during the communist regime.

Bill Barich

Barich is an American novelist, essayist, and travel writer whose work has been critically acclaimed for both the author's insight and his lively, readable style.

Andrew Bergman

Known for writing and directing such films as *The Freshman* and *Honeymoon in Vegas*, Bergman is also respected as a novelist and playwright.

Roz Chast

New Yorker cartoonist Chast is noted for her wry and witty observations on modern life. Her work has appeared in several published collections, and she has also illustrated a number of children's books.

Marshall Crenshaw

Acclaimed for his well-crafted lyrics and complex, original rock compositions, singer-songwriter Crenshaw recently completed *Hollywood Rock*, a guide to rock and roll films.

Roger Garaudy

French author and political figure Garaudy has been influential both within and outside his native country's communist party. He is well known for works such as From Anathema to Dialogue: A Marxist Challenge to the Christian Churches.

David Gelernter

Gelernter's achievements have made him an influential name in computer science. His writings include *The Muse in the Machine: Computerizing the Poetry of Human Thought*. In 1993, this scientist and author survived a mail-bomb attack by the so-called "Unabomber."

Barry Levinson

Well-known for his comedic touch on *The Carol Burnett Show*, actor and producer Levinson has also written and directed such films as *Diner*, *Avalon*, *Toys*, and *Sleepers*.

Andrew Lloyd Webber

Lloyd Webber is the composer of such hit stage musicals as Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, Jesus Christ Superstar, Evita, Cats, The Phantom of the Opera, and Sunset Boulevard.

Lee Miller

One of the most distinctive models to pose for *Vogue* magazine in the 1920s and 1930s, Miller became an important Surrealist photographer and overseas correspondent during World War II. Her photographs are collected in three volumes, including *Lee Miller's War: Photographer and Correspondent with the Allies in Europe, 1944-45.*

Alvaro Mutis

Colombian-born poet and author Mutis, a major Latin American literary talent, portrays the desolation of contemporary life in his prose and verse.

Yitzhak Rabin

Israeli Prime Minister Rabin, who was assassinated in 1995, was a recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize, and a major political figure in the Middle East throughout his career. His memoirs were published in 1979.

Cathleen Schine

Schine's novels are often lauded for their combination of droll humor and sharp insight, a writing style which also surfaces in her periodic columns for the *New York Times Magazine*.

Al Stump

A sports journalist and the author of several biographies of athletes, Stump is best-known for *Cobb*, a candid look at one of baseball's legendary talents.

Elizabeth Wurtzel

Author and music critic Wurtzel shares her troubled past and life-long battle with depression in the book *Prozac Nation: Young and Depressed in America*.

Belle Yang

China-born artist and writer Yang won critical acclaim for her 1994 work Baba: A Return to China upon My Father's Shoulders.

SIDELIGHTS: Abbas, an Iranian-born photojournalist, travels the world, capturing with his camera's lens the oppression, despair, joy, and passion of life, especially in Third World countries. In preparing his book Allah O Akbar: A Journey through Militant Islam he visited twenty-nine countries, photographically recording the effects of Islam on society, beginning in his homeland in 1978 when, during a revolution, the Shah of Iran was deposed and the Ayatollah Khomeini gained power. While Abbas devotes most of his book to revealing the turmoil caused by Islamic zealots, he also portrays the impression Islam has etched on other nations.

According to critics Allah O Akbar is a somber book, depicting the ravages of war through graphic images of the orphaned, wounded, imprisoned, and dead, all of them victims of tribalism disguised as nationalism and of religion used as a political force. Some reviewers faulted the author for only capturing the images that support his own particular disdain for militant Islam. Fouad Ajami, for instance, writing in the New York Times Book Review, criticized "the defect of Abbas's vision and his willful determination to have us see only what he wants us to see."

Times Literary Supplement contributor Charles Glass, who found Allah O Akbar "a very good book," also questioned the subjective nature of the book. Glass stated: "If Allah O Akbar has flaws . . . they are that its contents began life as a book and that the photographer wrote the text. . . . Many of these photographs were taken purposely for a book that would be a comprehensive view of contemporary Islam." Nevertheless, Glass admired Abbas's art: "There is an indefinable beauty in Abbas's photographs of the Iranian people in the early days of the revolution when, for good or for ill, they are assuming power; and an equally indefinable melancholy resignation on their faces in the pictures taken after the clergy had taken dominion over their lives." A contributor to the Economist termed Allah O Akbar a"visually stunning" work.

Abbas told CA: "When I started my seven-year journey, I was interested in Islamism, as a political, militant ideology. I wanted to portray its roots and causes, to capture its various cultural and social manifestations. But it soon became obvious that Islamism feeds on Islam. It is not a deviance as some observers and critics would like us to believe. The sooner we address this, the more chance we have to understand this phenomenon and act upon it.

"As a photographer I had to broaden my scope and look into the culture, Islam in its diversity, upon which the germ of Islamism grows. My book is a personal journey in the lands of the muslims at an important time in their history.

"It is also a book of photographs, i.e., a book 'written with light."

ADAMS, Leon D(avid) 1905-1995

OBITUARY NOTICE—See index for CA sketch: Born February 1, 1905, in Boston, MA; died September 14, 1995, in San Francisco, CA. Wine connoisseur, historian, journalist, and author. Adams developed an interest in wines which led him to write a number of books on the subject, becoming one of America's foremost wine experts in the twentieth century. Beginning his career as a reporter for the San Francisco News in the early 1920s, Adams held a similar position with the San Francisco Bulletin before becoming bureau manager with McClatchy Newspapers from 1928 through the mid-1930s. He was associated with the Organized Grape Growers League of California in the early 1930s and founded the Organized Wine Institute in San Francisco in 1934. Adams helped organize the Society for Medical Friends of Wine in 1939, beginning a fifty-year affiliation with the group, during which he served, at various times, as its executive secretary and editor. He also worked to ensure the passage of farm winery bills, which helped grape producers in their efforts to sell wines. Adams wrote several books about wine, including Commonsense Book of Wine, The Wines of America, The Commonsense Book of Drinking, and The Wine Study Course. His first published volume was Striped Bass Fishing in California and Oregon.

SIDELIGHTS: Paul Alexander is best known for his biographical studies of notable artists and performers. Among his early works is Rough Magic: A Biography of Sylvia Plath, which considers the life and work of the confessional poet who killed herself in 1962. Rough Magic focuses on Plath's marriage to fellow poet Ted Hughes, a relationship that Alexander contends proved unsatisfying, even violent, and he speculates that Hughes might have contributed significantly to Plath's suicide. M. C. Dalton, writing in the Bloomsbury Review, declared that Alexander's book "is startling in the extent to which it attacks Hughes." Dalton added, though, that the biography "does attempt to humanize its subject."

Alexander is also the author of Boulevard of Broken Dreams: The Life, Times, and Legend of James Dean. Here he recounts the life of the celebrated young actor whose death in 1955 sparked a cult following. In the volume Alexander suggests that Dean's onscreen projection of vulnerability and sensitivity was largely derived from his undisclosed homosexuality. Molly Haskell, writing in the New York Times Book Review, acknowledged Boulevard of Broken Dreams as "the first biography of Dean to center on the star's sexuality," but she concluded that the volume was more titillating than illuminating. Entertainment Weekly reviewer L. S. Klepp proclaimed the Dean biography "steamy and soggy," while London Times reviewer Jonathan Coe noted that Boulevard of Broken Dreams "is pitched at an intelligent audience and is relatively free of gushing hagiography."

Among Alexander's other publications is *Death and Disaster: The Rise of the Warhol Empire and the Race for Andy's Millions*, which details the various factions that vied for portions of the estate and property that remained after the demise of the wealthy, unabashedly commercial artist Andy Warhol.

ALLAN, Ted 1916(?)-1995 (Edward Maxwell; William Maxwell)

OBITUARY NOTICE—See index for CA sketch: Born Alan Herman, January 25, 1916 (some sources say 1918), in Montreal, Quebec, Canada; died of respiratory complications, June 29, 1995, in Toronto, Ontario, Canada. Actor, playwright, screenwriter, and author. Allan was a prolific author, penning scripts for film and theater productions, as well as fiction for children and adults. Allan, who also wrote as Edward Maxwell and William Maxwell, began writing in his teens, and also found work as an actor. His first novel, This Time a Better Earth, was published in 1939 and was followed by the acclaimed biography The Scalpel, The Sword: The Story of Doctor Norman Bethune. Allan saw his first play, The Money Makers, produced in Toronto in 1954. Among Allan's other notable plays were Gog and Magog and Oh, What a Lovely War. He adapted his children's story Willie, the Squowse as a play as well. Allan received the most fame for his screenplays, however. His screenplay for Lies My Father Told Me won him an Academy Award as well as a Christopher Award and a Golden Globe Award for Best Foreign Film. Allan's script for Love Streams, written with acclaimed filmmaker John Cassavetes, also received praise.

ALLEN, Gay Wilson 1903-1995

OBITUARY NOTICE-See index for CA sketch: Born August 23, 1903, in Lake Junaluska, NC; died of pneumonia, August 6, 1995, in Raleigh, NC. Educator and author. One of the foremost authorities on American poet Walt Whitman, Allen won much acclaim for his biographies, especially The Solitary Singer: A Critical Biography of Walt Whitman, published in 1955. Allen devoted his career to teaching, serving at Bowling Green State University as an associate professor from 1935 until 1946. He then joined the faculty at New York University as a professor of English and taught there until his retirement in 1969. He held visiting professorships at Harvard and Emory Universities. His interest in Whitman inspired him to cofound the Walt Whitman Birthplace Association. His numerous volumes on the poet include The New Walt Whitman Handbook, Walt Whitman: Notebooks and Unpublished Prose Manuscripts, and Walt Whitman as Man, Poet, and Legend. A biographer of other subjects as well, Allen penned the best seller Waldo Emerson: A Biography, which was a Pulitzer Prize nominee. His study William James: A Biography also was lauded by critics. Among the honors he received were the Lowell Prize, the Tamiment Institute Book Award, and induction into the New Jersey Literary Hall of Fame.
