

## Parliaments in Asia

Much writing on politics in Asia revolves around the themes of democracy and democratisation with a particular focus on political systems and political parties. This book, on the other hand, examines the role that parliaments – a key institution of democracy – play in East, Southeast and South Asia including Taiwan and Hong Kong. Parliaments in these locations function in a variety of historical, political and socio-economic circumstances with different implications for institution building and political development. This book examines questions like how accessible, representative, transparent, accountable and effective are parliaments? To what extent are parliaments able to hold other political actors to account or how far are they constrained by the political environment in which they operate? Going further, this book considers how new media such as the Internet and other social platforms, through providing avenues for individuals to articulate their views separate from official channels, are influencing the ways parliaments work. To stay relevant, parliamentarians need to reach out and engage these individuals in formulating, deciding and fine-tuning policies. In the information age, being a parliamentarian has become more challenging and how a parliamentarian copes with this change will shape the nature and pace of political development.

## **Editors**

Yongnian ZHENG is Professor and Director of East Asian Institute, National University of Singapore. He is Editor of Series on Contemporary China (World Scientific Publishing) and Editor of China Policy Series (Routledge). He is also a co-editor of China: An International Journal. He has studied both China's transformation and its external relations. His papers have appeared in journals such as Comparative Political Studies, Political Science Quarterly, Third World Quarterly and China Quarterly. He is the author of 13 books, including Technological Empowerment, De Facto Federalism in China, Discovering Chinese Nationalism in China and Globalization and State Transformation in China, and co-editor of 11 books related to China's politics and society including the latest volume China and International Relations: The Chinese View and the Contribution of Wang Gungwu (2010). Besides his research work, Professor Zheng has also been an academic activist. He served as a consultant to United Nation Development Program on China's rural development and democracy. In addition, he has been a columnist for Xinbao (Hong Kong) and Zaobao (Singapore) for many years, writing numerous commentaries on China's domestic and international affairs. Professor Zheng received his B.A. and M.A. degrees from Beijing University, and his Ph.D. at Princeton University. He was a recipient of Social Science Research Council-MacArthur Foundation Fellowship (1995– 1997) and John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation Fellowship (2003–2004). He was Professor and founding Research Director of the China Policy Institute, University of Nottingham, United Kingdom.

Liang Fook LYE is Assistant Director and Research Fellow at the East Asian Institute of the National University of Singapore. His research interests include China's central-local relations, the mass media (including newspaper media groups and the Internet), leadership changes and political legitimacy in China. He is also interested in Singapore's relations with China particularly on the various bilateral cooperative projects between the two countries. In particular, he was part of a team that completed a study on the Suzhou Industrial Park, a flagship project between China and Singapore. He follows closely developments on the Sino-Singapore Tianjin Eco-city Project,
