



'He scored five tries,' said Harry.


'the first wise man . . .


'She wore purple pants,' said Kate.

"... and I have to say, Lo! The star is in the east!"






There was silence. Then her dad said, 'Good grief!'.

'It's not good grief,' said Ella Bella. 'It's Lo! The star is in the east!'


'Sorry, Princess. What did you say?'

'No, it was, "Blow the car let's have a feast"!' laughed Sam.


Then they all laughed. They would not stop laughing.

Ella Bella shouted again, 'I'm not your princess!'





Her mother said, 'You are nobody's princess when you shout like that. You may leave the table and go to your room.'

They all laughed again. They would not stop laughing.








When she reached the front gate she met Bonzer.
