About the Cover

The collage of buildings assembled on the cover of *Deutsch Aktuell 1* is particularly appropriate for a first-level language textbook. One can't build anything lasting without first laying a good foundation. The science-art architecture is a paradigm for the study of a foreign language. The functions, vocabulary and structures of language resemble the bricks and mortar of a Gothic cathedral, the girders and rivets of a modern skyscraper, the timbers and plaster of a *Fachwerkhaus*. The architect finds limitless creative expression within the confines of the laws of physics and available materials. So, too, the student of German will find infinite capacity for expression and communication once the functions, vocabulary and structures of German are understood and practiced. A building with a poor foundation will not stand for long. A student with a good foundation will be able to develop and use those skills for a lifetime.

The front cover's three main visual elements illustrate European history's three great social movements led by Church, State and Commerce.
