

Joyce Appleby, Ph.D. is Professor of History at UCLA. Dr. Appleby's published works include *Capitalism* and a New Social Order: The Jeffersonian Vision of the 1790s and Ideology and Economic Thought in Seventeenth-Century England, which won the Berkshire Prize. She served as president of the Organization of American Historians and chaired the Council of the Institute of Early American History and Culture at Williamsburg. Dr. Appleby is past president of the American Historical Association.

Alan Brinkley, Ph.D. is Professor of American History at Columbia University. His published works include *Voices of Protest: Huey Long, Father Coughlin, and the Great Depression,* which won the 1983 American Book Award, *The End of Reform: New Deal Liberalism in Recession and War,* and *The Unfinished Nation: A Concise History of the American People.* He received the Levenson Memorial Teaching Prize at Harvard University. Dr. Brinkley is a member of the national advisory board for the PBS series "The American Experience."

James M. McPherson, **Ph.D.** is George Henry Davis Professor of American History at Princeton University. Dr. McPherson is the author of 11 books about the Civil War era. These include *Battle Cry of Freedom: The Civil War Era*, for which he won the Pulitzer Prize in 1989, and *For Cause and Comrades: Why Men Fought in the Civil War*, for which he won the 1998 Lincoln Prize. He is a member of many professional historical associations, including the Association for the Preservation of Civil War Sites and the Civil War Trust.




What Do the Themes in The American Journey Mean?
