PREFACE

I described in its Preface an earlier book, Blindfold Games, as being only incidentally autobiography, but more accurately "the raw material out of which I began to write poetry". The same principle applies here, at least as far as the autobiographical part is concerned. Coastwise Lights turns out mainly to be about friends – painters and writers – who were close to me and who have since died. I had not intended the book to take such a shape, but there it is.

Blindfold Games began in India and ended, after describing a Sussex adolescence, Oxford and five years in the Navy, in occupied Germany. It was about coming to terms with war and a hunger for writing replacing a passion for cricket.

The present volume takes the story from 1947 to 1978, when I returned to London after living in Sussex for twenty-five years. During most of this time I was working for the Observer, as well as taking over the London Magazine in 1961 and starting up as a publisher in 1965. As in Blindfold Games I have used poems written at the time as illustrations and to fill in a few gaps. Some relate to the text, others to relationships or derive from working journeys in Europe, Australia, Africa and the Caribbean.
