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

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英国著名学者亚历山大先生新著 Direct English 是一套题材内容、语言编排和教学手段都具有特色的新颖教材。全书共分六级,从初级英语到中高级英语,由易到难,由简人繁,循序渐进,可供广大英语爱好者用作教材,也可供在校学生用作辅助教材。该教材有下列特点:

- 一、语言的真实性与恰当性并重。本教材中绝大部分课文是对话,主要人物有律师、室内设计师、小职员、大学生等,也有旅馆经理和旅馆从业人员、旅客等,另外还有为数不少的他们的亲朋好友。因此会话者相互之间的人际关系比较多样化,有上司下属关系、同事关系、朋友关系、亲属关系、业主顾客关系等等,不一而足。由于会话者各有不同的身分,他们之间有不同的人际关系,会话发生于不同的场合,各人各有不同的情态,这就势必产生语言的多样性,因为每个人说的话都要言如其人,恰如其分。以一般传统会话教材中的会话而言,往往是各式各样的套话,千篇一律。而本教材的会话材料则有强烈的真实感和精确的恰当性,并且有浓厚的生活情趣和时代气息。
- 二、语言功能和语法项目编排系统性强。本教材的语言功能和语法项目的安排,不仅仅是循序渐进,而是循环往复,不断扩大加深。以第1册至第3册的语言点为例,每册书9个单元,每单元3课。其语言点共分9大类,即:谈谈你自己、谈谈他人、有礼貌的请求、何时、何地、对各种事物的描述、喜爱与不喜爱、要求与需要、

各种行为,这9类语言点,每单元安排3个,每3个单元轮换一次。3册书共计27单元,这9个语言点就各反复出现9次之多。语言点每出现一次,在难度上都逐步加深;再以语法项目而言,也是如此,第4至第6册的语言点是语法项目,也是不断循环,不断加深。这对培养学生的语言能力十分有利。

三、**学习用书的教学安排富有针对性和系统性**。以学生母语编写的学习用书是本教材的一大特点。它便于教师组织教学,也便于学生自学。学习用书在每单元之初都简明扼要地列出各课的语言要点。每一课文前又列出该课的具体语言点,主要是注释和应该注意的问题,帮助学生吸收语言材料。每课课文有译文,供学生参考。课文后有语言学习和巩固实践,学生边看边听边说,有机械性实践,也有灵活性和创造性实践。如果学生能按照学习用书的具体教学安排学习并实践,孜孜不倦,必定会得益匪浅。

总之,这是一套培养语言能力和交际能力,兼顾语言真实性和恰当性的好教材。

使用对象与目的:

本教材的使用对象为大、中学生和成年自学者。全套教材1—6级,语法结构从简到繁,句子长度从短到长,会话的场合由易到难,梯度逐渐增加,学习者的听说技能通过每3课一次学习重点的重复,在不知不觉中达到脱口而出说英语的程度。本套教材着重培养学生在现代社会中英语交际的能力,是初级到高级各级英语培训的理想教材,以自修为主,也可供在校师生用于课堂教学。

教材内容:

本套教材由以下各部分组成:

- 主课本及与之完全配套的学习用书
- 教学录音带(包括课文的多种形式的反复操练及全部练习, 每册 9 盘)
- 自学录音带(教学录音带的节选版,包括一遍课文朗读及全部练习,每册4盘)
- 原声录音带(用于提高听说能力的真实环境下的原声带,每 册 1 盘)
- 录像带
- CD ROM
- VCD

教材特色:

- 各种载体充分利用,最大程度地调动人与电脑、录音带、录像带的双向交流
- 听说领先,以培养交际能力为目标
- 以学生为中心,强调自学,适合自学
- 真实情景,真实语言材料,地道美国英语

课本介绍:

每级课本包括 1 册主课本和 1 册学习用书,两册书相辅相成、配合使用。每级分为 9 个单元,每单元 3 课。

主课本:每单元包括3篇课文,每篇课文之后是相应的语言学习和实践。

学习用书:每单元之前简明扼要地列出各课的语言要点。每一课课文前又列出该课的具体语言点,对其加以详尽注释,帮助学生吸收语言材料。每课课文有译文,供学生参考。课文之后是语言学习和巩固实践,学生边看边听边说,有机械性实践,也有灵活性和创造性实践。书后有每单元的自测试题及其答案,同时除每单元之后的分词表外,全书有总的单词表索引。


