内容提要

本书紧扣大学英语教学大纲和全国四、六级英语统考大纲,针对性强,实用价值大;题量丰富,共5386 道题,覆盖面广;选题典型、常用,集英美和国内试题之精华;试题突出固定搭配、习惯用法、结构特点和近义词语之辨别;题前列有主题词,按主题词的字母顺序编排,便于读者查找,并可使读者便捷地获得解题要领;全部试题都附有答案。本书主要适用对象是准备四、六级英语统考的大学生,亦可作为广大英语自学者的词汇语法练习手册。

前 言

本书在收集大量英美试题及国内大学英语四、六级考试、EPT 和研究生英语考试考题(特别是新近曝光的四、六级英语正式统考真题)的基础上,严格根据高校理工科用和文理科用两份《大学英语教学大纲》、尤其是国家教委最新调整的文理科和理工科统一的《大学英语教学大纲通用词汇表》以及大学英语全国四、六级统考大纲和样题精选加工而成。凡超出大纲范围的弃之,合乎大纲要求的则尽量择取典型、常用、难度适中的题收入本书。因此,本书集中了各家之精华,具有很强的针对性和实用性,并在国内现有的同类书的基础上有新的修改和增添。

本书针对大学英语四、六级考试的具体要求以及中国学生 学习英语的主要难点,在题库构成方面,突出了固定搭配、习 惯用法、结构特点和近义词语的辨别,最大限度地满足了广大 读者的实际需要。

本书编排与众不同,每道题都确定出一个主题词或叫关键词(主题词不完全等于正确的答题词),列于题前;主题词相同的题排在一起,但主题词只在其中第一道题前列出。所有主题词如词典词目一样按其字母顺序排列。这样既便于读者查找,又可提示解题要领。

题库中的题型以选择填空为主,以便与正式统考题接轨;同时也有少量的选择改错题,以适应其他考试。各题的答案附于书末,供核对用。

为区分不同等级,根据英语教学大纲的规定,在主题词和

试题前分别加上或不加△号。加上△号的为六级词或题,不加 的是四级词或题。

本题库目的明确,主要是为准备考英语四级和六级的大学生练习之用,也可供报考研究生、EPT、TOEFL和 GRE 等人员参考,同时也为大学英语教师在确定词汇教学重点、选择例句和命题等方面提供素材和线索。它不仅对考词汇和结构直接有用,对考 cloze、改错和具体使用英语也有帮助。

本书引用了国内外一些试题(详见书后的主要参考书目), 在此谨向作者致以真挚的谢忱。本书得以顺利出版,应感谢中 国广播电视出版社的有关编辑同志的大力支持和帮助。书中若 有谬误,责任在我们;如蒙指正,不胜感激。
