

前言

本教材是按照大学英语教学大纲提出的培养学生较强阅读能力的要求和分级教学的需要而编写的。本书为第一册。

阅读教材的目的是使学生尽可能多地接触语言本体,接触多种多样的语言材料,开阔视野,提高阅读能力。因此,本书课文力求题材广泛、体裁多样,既选用反映最新科学成就的医学、生物学、心理学和人文科学的科普文章,又选用各种体裁的文学作品,如短篇小说、长篇小说选段以及传记、书信、演说和日记等。

我们选用的课文大多是原文,词汇较丰富。为了便于学生多掌握常用词汇,我们采用电子计算机对词汇进行分析整理,作不同级别的安排:对于要求学生在入学时应基本掌握的1630个E级词,不再列出;对于1~4级应掌握的2420个I级词,在每课课文后列出,不作注释,供学生在预习或复习时加以学习或巩固,对于通过构词法和上下文可以猜测意义的词,鼓励学生自行释义,对于未掌握的I级词,则要求学生查书后I级词汇表和词典,着重记忆;对于要求5~6级掌握的1300个A级词和超出大纲要求的词,则在每课课文后列出,并作注释,但不强调现在掌握;也就是说,着重要求学生掌握本书中出现的819个I级词。

关于练习,根据大学英语四级考试大纲要求,全书共设计了170 道阅读理解题,其中一小部分用于扩大学生的词汇量。书中还设计了180 道词汇练习题,是从819个 I级词汇中选出来的,其中较多的是动词以及一些多义词和其它常用词。

关于注释,我们希望学生在阅读中力求从词句的分析扩展到段落和篡章。因而尽量减少了词汇和语法方面的注释,着重对部分较难理解的句子和文章中一些文化背景知识进行注释。

我们力求保证教材的思想性、科学性、启发性、可读性和适用性,根据外语教学的实际需要和阅读教材的特点,较多地选用了未经改写的文学作品,使教材中的课文出现了长短不一,深浅各异的现象,希望教师在教学中机动灵活地使用。有些课文篇幅长、生词多、语言难,如第2,3,13,14课。我们也希望学生能对"The Scalpel, the Sword"、"The Final Diagnosis"、"Arrowsmith"等小说发生兴趣,有机会通读这几本书,从思想上、语言上均能有所收获。本书主要选用有关医学的文学作品,这仅是一种尝试,恳请使用本书的同志在这方面多是意见。

本书系上海医科大学外语教研室集体编写,由冯承洛担任主编,林谋济、陈社胜担任副主编;葛定基、桑乃华担任审校,李定钧担任特约编辑,陈伟德、李磊、顾兆俼、尤文迈等参加编写。此外,值得特别感谢的是数学教研室讲师赵耐青,他对于本书的词汇做了大量的微机分析与处理工作。由于编者水平有限和经验不足以及时间仓促,书中一定存在不少错误和缺点,欢迎使用本书的同志随时批评指正。

在编写过程中,承蒙学校领导、基础医学部领导以及数学教研室和外语教研室领导和同志们的大力支持和帮助,顺此表示衷心的感谢。

Lesson One

Dr. Norman Bethune's Diary®

I. Before Reading

II. Text

(1)

Although Yenan is one of the oldest towns in all China, it strikes me immediately as one of the best-run. In Hankow I found confusion, indecision, depressing signs of bureaucracy and inefficiency. In Yenan there is a sense of confidence and purpose in administrative circles. In the towns and cities I passed through on my way here I became accustomed to the sights of semi-feudalism—filthy dwellings, polluted streets, people in rags. Here, among the ancient structures, the streets are clean, teeming with people who seem to know where they're going. There is no sewage system, but there is obviously an organized disposal of sewage.

In contrast to the rest of China, the Special Region administration is developing an over-all program dovetailing social reform with organization of the Region's

capacities to make war against the Japanese. There is a University, attracting housands of students from other areas. There is a newly created Medical Training School designed to furnish the army with medical personnel. There is a growing hospital, and though medical facilities are primitive, the government here has introduced free medical treatment for all?

Irascible was the word. My "other self," Tung, couldn't find it, but I had no difficulty. I was "irascible," they said, when things didn't go the way they should when they did things incorrectly; when they were inefficient. I was asked by each of them to be kinder (in my tone of voice) when I found that they did something wrong. I promised. Will I never learn? I promised—and fifteen minutes later was being extremely icy to a nurse because of crude handling of a dressing

He asked Tung to remind me of my promise.

I answered: "Yes, I remember. But remind him also that a life is involved when he's sloppy." \$\infty\$

I said it quietly, though, and to the nurse I added: "It is not up to me to forgive you for a sloppy dressing, but to the wounded soldier."

The soldier (a bad arm wound—shell splinter) looked up at him and said gravely: "I forgive you."

The nurse almost cried. I don't think I shall ever have to be "irascible" with him again. And I don't think I shall ever want to be.

I am tired, but I don't think I have been so happy for a long time. I am content. I am doing what I want to do. And see what my riches consist of! I have vital work that occupies every moment of my time. I am needed. More than that—to satisfy my bourgeois vanity—the need for me is expressed.

I have no money or the need for it. I have the inestimable good fortune to be among and to work among people to whom communism is a way of life, not merely a way of talking and thinking. Their communism is simple and profound, reflex as a knee jerk, unconscious as the movement of their lungs, automatic as the beating of the heart. They are implacable in their hate: world-embracing in their love.

The stoic Chinese indeed! Here I have found comrades who belong to the very hierarchy of humanity. They have seen cruelty, yet know gentleness; they have tasted bitterness, yet know how to smile; they have endured vast suffering, yet know patience, optimism, quiet wisdom. I have come to love them; I know they love me too.

Today is my 49th birthday. I have the proud distinction of being the oldest soldier at the front. I spent the day in bed. I went to bed at 6 this morning, having operated all night from 7 p.m. yesterday. We did 19 operations amongst 40 seriously wounded. First we dressed the less urgent wounds, then operated on those needed surgery. Three fractures of the skull were trephined, two amputations of the thigh, two suture perforations of the small intestines, half a dozen bad fractures of arms and legs-and the rest smaller operations. There were two Japanese wounded on whom I operated. There have been several other cases where we gave captured Japanese the same care we give our own wounded. (5) At one base hospital I was photographed with two of them. They wrote to their families in Japan, telling of the care we had given them and enclosing the photo.

We defeated the enemy. He left 50 dead on the field. We captured 40 rifles. We lost 40 men. A life for a rifle! That is the way we get our guns.
