

Down the road went the




stone until it fell into an old well which had not been used for many, many years. When the stone hit the water, the water began to move up and down; then out of the middle of it there came a great *arm and hand.





The cook obeyed but liked the young man so much that he didn't send him far away, but asked the gardener to let him work in the palace garden.
