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前言

古人云:"千里之行,始于足下。"英语学习亦如此。要想在英语学习方面有所突破,掌握词汇是关键,这已经成为众多英语成功人士的共识。为了最大限度地减少读者复习备考的盲目性,最大限度地节省他们的时间,作者认真研究了1990年至今历次大学英语四级考试全真试题中"词汇与结构"部分的命题原则、命题规律和命题形式,根据教育部最新颁布的《大学英语课程教学要求》,并结合作者10多年的教学经验,编写了此书。

与其他词汇类图书相比,本书无论在版式设计还是在写作思路上,都凸现了其独具的个性化魅力。

在第一部分**大学英语四级** 500 **题快速通关**中,作者努力做到了以下几个方面:

紧扣大纲,全真模拟 作者严格按照《大学英语课程教学要求》, 并结合近几年的全真试题,编写了这部分内容。

难易适中,适合练兵 在编写过程中,作者严格按照课程要求进行操作,使试题的难度始终与真题保持一致。因此,本部分具有高度的前瞻性,可以使读者准确地了解自己的英语水平,发现自己的长处与不足,以便指导将来的学习与复习。

内容全面,重点突出 在选材上,无论词汇知识,还是语法结构,作者都力争覆盖全部重点词汇和重点用法,对一些特别重要的语法知识,作者都在不同的位置安排了两个或两个以上的练习,供读者反复训练,以期熟练掌握。

详解精解,点面结合 在为试题做精解时,我们坚持这样一个原则:不但告诉读者答案,而且告诉读者解题的思路与方法,要使读者不但知其然,而且知其所以然。需要指出的是,作者在举例说明词汇用

法或语法规则时,引用了将近1000条名人名言,为了保持其原有的语言的风格特点,我们对个别例句中的一些不太符合现代语法的表达方式给予了保留,我们认为读者能够读懂这些句子,同时,这些句子的数量也非常小。

第二部分大学英语六级必考必背词汇具备的突出特点有:

重点词汇,考频统计 这是本部分最大的与众不同的特点。作者没有像传统的词汇书那样,按照从字母 A 到 Z 的顺序罗列词汇,而是按照单词考试频率,逆序排列重点单词,而对那些过去没有考试过,将来也不可能考得着的词汇,作者就舍弃之,不予给出。由于重点词汇,也就是本书中的高频词在考试中都有反复出现的规律,它们在实考中有着举足轻重的地位,读者对这类词汇应该格外注意,并予以全面掌握。

全新思路,全新编排 本书是根据语言学习的科学规律,运用全新的思路编排而成的,它除了包括一般词汇速记手册所惯常包含的本词、音标、词性、释义、短语等以外,还加上了全新内容:①疑难用法:指出非常重要的而且学生却往往难以掌握的语法、词汇知识。②联想记忆:列举出与本词在意义上相关的词汇,主要有同义词、反义词或属于同一范畴的词,便于学生运用联想记忆法在短时间内扩充词汇量。另外,作者还独具匠心地在这一栏目下加入了一些风趣睿智的标题,不但易于加深学生的记忆,而且也使记忆单词不再枯燥,而是一件其乐无穷的趣事。③同义词辨析:对重点难点同义词在意义和用法上加以区别,易于学生在对比中学习词汇的用法,使他们能够举一反三地掌握做词汇题的技巧。另外,请读者注意,"大学英语六级必考必背词汇"中标"*"的为四级词汇,标"▲"的为六级词汇,标"◆"为六级后词汇,未做标记的为中学词汇。

参加此书编写的还有杜晖、郭益友、邢殿普、包桂颖、周秀敏、王蜜 卿、霍东烨、张会琴老师。

由于编写时间仓促,作者时间有限,书中错误在所难免,请读者指正。
