

编者的话

怎样提高英语水平和语言运用能力是英语教师,更是广大学生所关心的问题。对此,许多名家提出了很多真知灼见。但是,归根结蒂就是"熟能生巧"(Practice makes perfect.)。要通过"练"(practice),才能"熟";只有"熟",才能达到"巧"(perfect)。《大学英语跟踪训练》正是为了给广大学生提供一个"练"的机会,以便最终达到"巧"而精心设计和编写的。
