### 编者的话

怎样提高英语水平和语言运用能力是英语教师, 更是广大学生所关心的问题。对此, 许多名家提出了很多真知灼见。但是, 归根结蒂就是"熟能生巧"(Practice makes perfect.)。要通过"练"(practice), 才能"熟"; 只有"熟", 才能达到"巧"(perfect)。《大学英语跟踪训练》正是为了给广大学生提供一个"练"的机会, 以便最终达到"巧"而精心设计和编写的。

《大学英语跟踪训练》是严格按照《大学英语教学大纲》的要求编写的,并与上海外语教育出版社出版的《大学英语》系列教材配套。它共分四册,每册十个单元。每单元对课本中所出现的重点和难点设计了包括词汇,短语,语法结构,阅读理解,完型填空,分翻译(中译英和英译中)练习。同时,为了使学生们的写作能和配有范文。为了方便学生在做完练习后能检测自己的成绩,及时组正错误,提高分析问题和解决问题的能力,在每册后都附上了答案。《大学英语跟踪训练》涵盖了除听力以外的英语学习所必须涉及的内容;它给学生提供了一个英语实践的园地。通过这套练习的训练,广大学生能及时巩固课本知识,真正做到学有所得,掌握和使用好英语这一社会主义现代化建设中必不可少的工具。
