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前 言

中共中央关于教育体制改革的决定指出:"建立一支有足够数量的、合格而稳定的师资队伍是实行义务教育、提高基础教育水平的根本大计"。

一九八六年,我国开办的卫星电视师范教育是深入教育 体制改革,普及九年制义务教育的迫切需要。

几年来的事实已经证明,利用卫星电视培训提高全国中小学教师,收效十分显著,走的是一条加速师资培训的新路子。目前,随着卫星电视师范教育的蓬勃发展,全国中小学教师的学历培训任务将陆续完成,因此,广泛而又有效地对广大中小学教师进行继续教育就显得十分必要。重点是对新教师和骨干教师的培训。根据国家教委的要求,小学教师电视教材的制作,从今年起重点转入继续教育,初中教师的继续教育电视教材正在试制,其中英语专业教师的继续教育电视教材先行一步。大体可从以下三方面考虑:

第一,以九年制义务教育初中英语教学大纲为依据,组织教师了解义务教育初中英语教材的特点及其理论基础,学习和掌握新教材的教学方法和教学技巧,使教师们能顺利地进行教学,提高教学质量。

第二,组织教师学习和研究优秀教师示范课、优秀的教学经验和新教学大纲的学习和培训。

第三,组织教师有的放矢地学习英语教师基本功训练电 视系列课程。

为了学习第一、二部分内容,突出学习第三部分内容, 我们结合英语教师需要掌握的基本功,编制了中学英语教师 基本功训练电视系列课程。为更好地帮助学员学习,使电视 教材与文字教材相配套,我们将已拍摄好的和即将拍摄的电 视教材的文字稿本整理汇集成一套《英语基本功训练》丛 书。我们愿将这套丛书奉献给广大的教师们,希望广大教师 通过学习,提高素质,促进教学效果和教学质量的提高。

我们深信《英语基本功训练》丛书对正在兴起的中学英 语教师继续教育将会起到应有的作用。

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Introduction

Hello, everyone! Welcome to our program! Let me introduce myself. I'm Zhang Chengmo, a teacher of English Department II, Shanghai International Studies University.

In the past few weeks, our department received a lot of letters from middle school teachers of English all over China asking for advice about how to use English dictionaries. They say that they use dictionaries every day, but they use them for looking up the meanings of English words, and sometimes the meanings they have looked up in the dictionaries do not fit into the context. So they wonder if they are using the dictionaries correctly.

Some teachers are users of ALD, or Oxford Advanced Learner's Dictionary of Current English. They want to know how to make use of the "verb patterns" mentioned in the dictionary. Some teachers are using A New English—Chinese Dictionary. They find it very difficult to look up the meanings of English set phrases. They want to be advised in this respect.

Some teachers are using Webster's New World Dictionary of the American Language, and they have noticed that there are other dictionaries also with the name of Webster attached to them. They want to know more about these Webster dictionaries and also American dictionaries in general.

Some teachers are doing translation work, and they find it difficult to translate the four-character Chinese phrases like 胸有成竹 into appropriate English. They want to know something about Chinese-English dictionaries.

Some teachers have access to *Encyclopedia Britannica*. They wonder why there are so many volumes, and they want to know how to make use of the 30 huge volumes.

And there are teachers who want to know the history of dictionaries.

After reading the letters, I have been thinking of making a series of TV talks on how to use English dictionaries to answer the above—mentioned questions and other questions put forward by middle school teachers of English. But what are the points to be covered in each topic? Well, I have discussed these questions with my colleagues, and now we have formed a plan. I have invited my colleagues here, and I'd like to introduce them to you.

This is Shi Huili, Bao Jianxin, Lu Feixia, Walter Wallace, a visiting professor from Johnson State College, U.S.A., Chai Mingjiong, Betty Barr, a British Council lecturer. They are all teachers of English Department II, Shanghai International Studies University.

Now we are going to tell you what we have prepared.

- W: We thought we would begin our series by informing our viewers of when and why dictionaries were invented. As an American historian, I am very much interested in the development of dictionaries in both America and in Britain.
- L: As a language teacher, I feel dictionaries play a very important part in learning and using languages and I'll talk about the history of dictionaries in China.
- W: Well, I hope to introduce our viewers to *Noah Webst-*er who developed the first American language English
 dictionary as well as introduce folks to the **Oxford** family of British language dictionaries.
- L: And we will also talk about the use of some special dictionaries such as the Oxford Duden English—Chinese Pictorial Dictionary and the Longman Lexicon of Contemporary English and some slang dictionaries.
- W: And perhaps we can also find some time to talk about the thesaurus, synonym and antonym dictionaries as well as some special history dictionaries in American and European histories.
- C: Professor Zhang just now mentioned that you have difficulties in using verbs and we know some dictionaries can tell you how verbs are used because those dictionaries have verb patterns. We have one dictionary here which we are going to talk about. That's Oxford Advanced Learner's Dictionary of Current English. This dictionary shows you not only the verb patterns but al-

- so other things.
- B: Yes, in our program we will talk about ELT dictionaries, English language teaching dictionaries, which are especially good for middle school English teachers. So in our programs, besides the verb patterns, we will talk, for example, about spelling, syllables, syllable boundaries and also pronunciation. They are very important for learners of English.
- C: We are not only going to talk about this dictionary but also another dictionary which is called *Longman Dictionary of Contemporary English*. That dictionary is also an ELT dictionary. Right?
- B: Yes, I think perhaps many of you have either one or the other of the two dictionaries. We are also going to introduce a new ELT dictionary to you. It's called the *Collins COBUILD ELT Dictionary*. So we will say something about it in our program.
- C: Yes, we're going to talk about three dictionaries, Oxford Advanced Learner's Dictionary of Current English, Longman Dictionary of Contemporary English, and Collins COBUILD ELT Dictionary. And if you want to know a certain word and the words related to the meaning of that word, we would like to introduce to you the Longman Lexicon.
- B: Then at the end of our program we will give you some exercises, just for some practice in using **ELT** dictionaries.

- C: So get your dictionaries ready if you have any of these dictionaries. We will talk about these dictionaries and tell you how they can be used.
- B: We look forward to seeing you.
- S: Mr Bao and I are going to discuss how to use A New English-Chinese Dictionary. It is a very commonly used dictionary among the middle school teachers of English in China. It is a very good dictionary, neither big nor small. It contains 50,000 practical words, and many, many useful phrases. Just now Professor Zhang mentioned that many teachers find it difficult to find the meanings of English phrases. So I think we shall concentrate on how to find the meanings of the English phrases.
- B: Let's also talk about the use of encyclopedias. Encyclopedias are in huge volumes. They are very useful tools, and they will furnish us, especially high school teachers, with very valuable information about human knowledge. Let's take Encyclopedia Britannica for an example. This encyclopedia consists of 30 volumes. It is in three parts. The first one is Propedia in 1 volume. The next group is called Micropedia in 10 volumes. The last group is Macropedia in 19 volumes. So if one knows how to use them, one can profit a lot. Now here is another dictionary called A Classified Chinese-English Vocabulary. There are 20,000 entries. We are going to talk about the use of this tiny book. And this is A

Chinese-English Dictionary. There are 6,000 Chinese single characters, and more than 50,000 compound words, set phrases, and examples. And in this book there are many very well-translated four-character Chinese idioms.

HISTORY OF DICTIONARIES

- L: Hello. Welcome back to our program on English language dictionaries and encyclopedias. Our first program will introduce you to the history of these word finders.
- W: Maybe before we begin the discussion of the history of these dictionaries, we should define the word "dictionary". The Oxf ord Illustrated Dictionary defines the word dictionary as follows: "Dictionary, a book dealing usually in an alphabetic order with the individual words of a language or some specified subject setforth their spelling, ting pronunciation, signification, history, etymology, equivalence in another language, etc."
- L: Interesting. A book of words to help us with the understanding of meanings of words and how to use the language effectively.
- W: Exactly. Dictionaries help us to use the language more effectively. Perhaps we should know something of their history, too.
