

Introduction

As we all know, language is part of culture and learning a second language involves learning a second culture. One's communicative competence lies in learning not only the language but also the cultural information.

With this academic view in mind we've compiled this book to introduce to the English language learners in China the American language and culture by way of looking at American signs.

This book consists of 33 units with each including photographs, problem-solving, basic sentences, practical dialogues new words and expressions, notes, and reading.

Photographs

Sequenced according to difficulty. 135 photographs have been selected form familiar, everyday contexts in America. They provide the learners not only with important vocabulary practice but also with the access to real American life.

Problem-solving

Pictures are followed by problem-solving exercises. They call for inference and careful reading and simulate real language problems that English learners may encounter. Solutions to the problems are offered at the bottom of the pages for students' reference.

Basic Sentences

For each unit we afford 15 basic sentences. They help students cope with signs which they may encounter once present on the American landscape. From the language point of view the study of these sentences can consolidate their sentence patterns.

Practical Dialogues

Pictures can easily lead into conversation practice. Related to specific signs, several practical dialogues in each unit have been suggested. We hope these dialogues can stimulate the students' interest, bring forth more conversation topics and put what they have seen and read into speaking practice.

Notes

Although the teaching of grammar is not an objective of this book, where appropriate, we give the detailed notes to the expressions, structures, and usages from the basic sentences and practical dialogues. These suggested notes can serve as simple grammar lessons to the beginners. They are useful to the intermediate students also.

Readings

To facilitate the students' thorough understanding of American culture we end each unit with an article of monologue. Thirty—three in all, they present a fairly complete picture of American life in all respects. We hope the students can benefit a lot from reading them.

The book is designed for language/culture training courses for students and scholars going abroad. It can certainly be incorporated as a supplement to the reading or the conversation classes in the college English programs. To the ordinary English learners it will also be helpful.

We are indebted to many individuals who made the publication of this book possible. Among those persons is Dr Tsung Chin an American Chinese professor, who introduced to us the book "Looking at American Signs" from which we got the idea of compiling the book. We particularly appreciate the work done for us by the American expert Mr. Jack Rouzer who contributed many good ideas and valuable parts to the book. We also thank Prof. Gao Jian who went through our manuscript before we put it into print. It is our sincere hope that the readers can give us your criticisms mand corrections in order to help us revise and perfect it in the future.


