内容提要

Child labor is growing problem, and not just in developing countries, according to the International Labor Office (ILO). A new study reveals that 25% children between the ages of 10 and 14, in both Asia and western Europe, are estimated to be working, many under illegal or dangerous conditions.

According to M. Hansenne, ILO director general, "Child labor is a human rights problem. It is just unacceptable that more than a hundred million children are working, that so many children are denied their basic rights." The study defines unacceptable child labor as conditions where children are "exploited, overworked, or deprived of their rights to health, education, and childhood."

The earning power of such children is pathetically low. Youngsters in Indonesian light bulb factories work an eighthour day, six-day week for the equivalent of \$3 in US cur-
