

In the past three years, the January issue of *a+u* has focused on 100 works of architecture built in a certain country since 2000. From those selected works, we have witnessed the country's as well as the era's distinctive traits. Following Switzerland, the Netherlands and Germany, this year we are featuring Spain and Portugal.

The turn of the 21st century saw, in both countries, a construction boom fueled by national events such as the Olympics and World Expo. After the worldwide financial crisis in 2008, however, the construction industry has been facing extreme difficulties. Many architects are looking for jobs overseas, while young architects have almost no work.

Almost ten years ago, many of us around the world were deeply shocked with admiration by the dynamic architecture delivered by the architects from these two countries. Even now after the boom has ceased, the works by Spanish and Portuguese architects allure us with their ideas, forms and details that derive from their unique culture.

In this edition, we are introducing 30 works, selected further among the 100, in three chapters: "New Icons", "In Context" and "The Everyday". Mr. Luis Fernández-Galiano, the editor of *Arquitectura Viva*, contributed an essay and introductions for the chapters. Through these themes, we may understand the role that architecture has been expected to take on in the past ten years of social transformation in the world.

We would like to express our special thanks to Mr. Galiano and his team for their cooperation without which this issue could not have materialized.

在过去的3年里，*a+u*每年都出版一本关于某个国家2000年以来的100件建筑作品的专辑（日文版为每年的1月刊，中文版分别为2011年6月刊，2012年6月刊和2013年4月刊），我们通过这些精选作品见证了这些国家以及时代的特征。继2011年的瑞士，2012年的荷兰和2013年的德国之后，今年则选择了西班牙与葡萄牙。

21世纪之交，这两个国家建筑业的蓬勃发展得益于奥林匹克运动会和世界博览会这样的国家盛会。然而，2008年的全球金融危机之后，两国的建筑业开始面临严峻的状况。很多建筑师都在寻找海外的工作，而年轻建筑师几乎没有工作。

大约10年前，世界各地的许多人都对这两个国家的建筑师充满活力的建筑作品深感震撼与钦佩。即使是建设热潮已结束的今天，西班牙与葡萄牙建筑师的作品仍以源自其独特文化背景的创意、形态与细节而充满魅力。







Spain and Portugal in the 21st Century

21世纪的西班牙建筑与葡萄牙建筑

Spain and Portugal are interwoven by geography and history, and in this latest stretch of the road our ups and downs have been almost simultaneous. The *annus mirabilis* that Spain enjoyed in 1992 – marked by the Olympic Games of Barcelona, the Expo of Seville and the stint as European culture capital of Madrid – was matched by a chain of Portuguese celebrations: the Pritzker Prize of the much admired Álvaro Siza Vieira that same year (the Spaniard Rafael Moneo would win it in 1996, and another Portuguese, Eduardo Souto de Moura, in 2011), Lisbon's turn as cultural capital of Europe in 1994 and, in the same city, the Expo of 1998, a blissful moment of international recognition and visibility a year after the opening, in Spain, of the Guggenheim Museum Bilbao, another architectural event of enormous reach. But with the turn of the century the euphoria waned. Portugal's economic stagnation began then, and Spain's crisis would come in 2008, after the financial panic provoked by the bankruptcy of Lehman Brothers; unsurprisingly, with both countries under the impact of economic emergency, Euro Cup 2004 in Portugal and Expo 2008 in Zaragoza were blurry events. Grand sporting victories – the Spanish football team picked up two Euro Cups and a World Cup between 2008 and 2012 – could not compensate for the loss of self-esteem and self-confidence in two nations demoralized by joblessness and uncertainty. In this panorama, the great achievements of Iberian architecture during the initial years of the 21st century tend to be looked back on with a mix of melancholy and repentance. Melancholy for a time of unbridled prosperity and optimism that might never come back, and repentance for the excesses that no doubt existed too. Avoiding both complacency and self-flagellation, perhaps the best chronicle of those years of change could be found in the works selected here to take stock of a period which has known ecstasy and agony. Although they have been grouped in three thematic sections, here the narrative will link the thematic to the geographic, tracing the peninsular perimeter – the northern coast, Atlantic Portugal and the Mediterranean shore – before going inland, and ending at the geometric center and largest city, Madrid.

1. The North Coast

The opening of the Guggenheim Museum Bilbao, in 1997, was an architectural event with few precedents. The great tempest of titanium raised by Frank O. Gehry aroused worldwide curiosity, bringing the idea of the iconic building to new heights, and in few places did the phenomenon make itself felt as clearly as in the place it came from, the Spanish coast that stretches from France to Portugal.

At the two extremes of the rainy green strip between the sea and the mountains are two fractured works by intellectual architects, and yet as different as can be: the slanting glass prisms of the Kursaal in San Sebastián, an auditorium and congress center finished in 1999 by Rafael Moneo that refers to nature in the context of a seaside resort; and the streams of petreous lava of the City of Culture of Galicia¹, a colossal complex of buildings partly inaugurated by Peter Eisenman in 2010 on a hill facing Santiago de Compostela, a pilgrimage city. In between, a rosary of

西班牙和葡萄牙国土接壤，有史以来，两国关系便错综交织、密切关联。近20年来，两国更是几乎亦步亦趋地经历了高潮和低谷。1992年，西班牙迎来了“奇迹之年”，举办了巴塞罗那奥运会、塞维利亚世博会和马德里的“欧洲文化之都”三大盛事；葡萄牙亦不遑多让——1992年，久负盛名的阿尔瓦罗·西扎·维埃拉荣膺普利兹克奖（1996年，西班牙人拉斐尔·莫内奥获奖；2011年，奖项再度荣归葡萄牙，由艾德瓦尔多·索托·德莫拉摘取）；1994年，里斯本成为“欧洲文化之都”；1997年，毕尔巴鄂古根海姆美术馆落成启用；1998年，里斯本世博会开幕。一时之间，西班牙和葡萄牙国际扬名、盛况空前。然而，进入21世纪以来，两国的兴盛欢腾却日渐平息、进而黯淡失色。

葡萄牙经济逐渐停滞。及至2008年，美国雷曼兄弟公司破产，引发全球金融恐慌，西班牙经济危机爆发。由于两国遭受经济危机，2004年葡萄牙欧洲杯和2008年萨拉戈萨世博会声势低迷，给人印象模糊，便也不足为怪。2008—2012年，西班牙足球队两度夺得欧洲杯、一举斩获世界杯，然而，时值两国失业率居高不下，全民陷入前途未卜的士气低落之中，重大体育赛事的胜利也无法弥补失落的自尊和自信。本文在此背景下对21世纪初叶的伊比里亚建筑成就进行回顾，不得不混合着一份伤感和遗憾。伤感是因为昔日的欣欣向荣、兴旺昌盛一去不复返；而遗憾则是由于在那短暂的光辉岁月中，建筑师们曾经如此狂放无度。本期专辑力求摒除自鸣得意或自怨自艾，精选出一批代表性项目，记录下那个狂喜和痛苦兼具的时代转折。本期内容划分为三大建筑主题，而本篇综述则以地理位置为序，环绕伊比利亚半岛，逐一介绍北部海岸（西班牙）、大西洋海岸（葡萄牙）、地中海海岸（西班牙），而后进入半岛内陆（西班牙），最后专门介绍位于半岛中心位置的第一大城市马德里。

1. 北部海岸（西班牙）

1997年落成的毕尔巴鄂古根海姆博物馆在建筑史上堪称史无前例。弗兰克·盖里一手掀起钛合金风暴，引来全世界的好奇和瞩目，将“地标建筑”的概念推向了全新的高度。由此引发的轰动效应在西班牙北部海岸（从法国延伸到葡萄牙）最为显著。

北部海岸是一条多雨的绿色地带，横展于大洋与群山之间。该地区的东西两端各自坐落着一座由才华横溢的建筑师所设计的建筑，两者在外观上均充满断裂感，但实质上大相径庭、风格各异：位于海滨度假胜地圣塞瓦斯蒂安的库塞尔礼堂及会议中心由拉斐尔·莫内奥设计，于1999年竣工，该建筑外观形如倾斜的玻璃棱镜，映衬着周边的自然环境；而彼得·埃森曼设计的加西利亚省新文化中心于2010年揭幕，这幢巨大的综合楼坐落在小山边，外形如熔岩流淌，朝向圣地（圣地亚哥·德孔波斯特拉）。位于这两者之间的还有一连串的地标建筑：盖里的古根海姆博物馆坐落在巴斯克地区的最大城市毕尔巴鄂；伦佐·皮亚诺的博坦中心位于桑坦德，将于2014年竣工；而2010年启用的尼迈耶中心伫立在阿斯图里亚斯省阿维莱斯市，纪念着百岁老人巴西大师。

上述五座地标建筑之中有四座为外国建筑师的作品——这充分体现出
