# **PREFACE**

### Ren Manxin

The favourable response of our readers both at home and abroad to the series of pictures of Rain Flower Pebbles with introductory essays which appeared in a special column of the 32nd issue of our periodical The Fine Arts published in November 1985 gave us impetus to prepare for the publication of an exquisite collection of pictures to be entitled An Album of Rare Stones and distributed among our readers all over the world. However, we were embarking on the publication of The Great: Treasury of Chinese Fine Arts at the time, and we had some financial difficulties. Therefore we paid a special visit to the Nanjing Tourism Administration, striving to enlist more subscribers to the album in preparation. To our regret, our efforts were of no avail, and we had to put off the publication. Nevertheless we had never for a moment given up the idea, and we felt all the more unworthy of the expectations of our readers when, in August 1989, the Jiangsu Ancient Book Publishing House and the Colourprinting House of Hong Kong worked together and had their elegant Album of Rain Flower Treasure published ahead of us. Luckily enough, the Shanghai Pebble Lovers' Society held its "First Session of Shanghai's Rare Stone Exhibition" at the Shanghai Museum of Natural History early this year, and we took the opportunity to call on a lot more Rain Flower Pebble collectors. With the concerted efforts that came from all those interested and five months of strenuous work, we have now got this volume off press to offer as a tribute to our readers. Instead of An Album of Rare Stones, it is entitled The Choicest Rain Flower Pebbles. As there has already been excellent work before this, what we can do is only to catch up with our predecessors so as to realize our longcherished ambition.

I remember that in the pictures and essays in connection with Rain Flower Pebbles in the 32nd issue of our periodical The Fine Arts, each pebble was given a number instead of a name so that the reader could enjoy the stones to his own heart's content without being influenced by others who might have given names from quite different points of view. That way of arrangement was approved by the reading public, especially by amateurs in the verse, prose and drawing circles. Now as the present volume is composed of hundreds of pictures of Rain Flower Pebbles, we are obliged to give each stone a suggested title, for we are afraid that the numbering system may hinder the interflow between one's natural feelings and full appreciation of the stones. It is hoped, however, that the titles given here will not limit the reader's aesthetic appreciation, and that the reader will be content with the amount of delight he draws from each picture because the depth of art in a pebble is in proportion to the reader's own power of imagination.

For the preparation of this volume, our thanks are due to: The reading public for their great care and enthusiasm,






