

内容提要

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前言

近年来,越来越多的外语教育专家和教师认识到外语学习的目标应该有两个:即把某一种外语作为"知识"来学习,或把这一种外语作为"交际工具"来学习。前者主要以"语法"为重点研究对象并以"精确"为评估标准,引导学生将绝大部分精力和时间用于对句子结构的分析和比较。因此,以"知识"为学习目标的外语专业学生有能力把目标语(target language)的各种句子结构和语言特色评析得头头是道,但不一定能将他的评析用目标语完整清晰地表达出来。社会上流传的所谓"哑巴英语"的说法也是这种学习目标的定位结果。对我国绝大部分学外语的学生来说,其学习的目标无疑应是掌握"交际工具"。对于这部分学生,教师只有把外语学习的重点放在提高学生的目标语运用能力上,才有可能将学生真正置于一种"自然语言学习环境"中,通过"学会表达"——"正确表达"——"清晰正确表达"——"完整清晰正确表达"这样一种循序渐进的自然过程,达到全面提高学生交际能力的教学目标。

《新编商务英语口语》是在老版《商务英语口语》的基础上,以心理学、教育学和外语学习理论为编写指导思想,在语言材料选用和课文结构设计上贯穿了"学用结合、重在运用"的原则。课文内容着重反映当代日常生活和现实商务活动的真实情景、练习活动丰富,实用性强。本教材虽然是专门为学习商务英语的学生设计和编写的,但也可用作非商务英语专业学生的教材和英语爱好者的自学课本。

本教材全部课文内容都是围绕美国商人 Henry White 一家在中国和英美等国的日常生活和商务活动而展开,涉及经济、贸易、工农业、教育、旅游、投资、金融、劳务和房地产等领域中的考察、谈判、签约、网上交易和电子商务等活动。每个单元都有一个中心话题和与话题相关的课堂练习活动,旨在促使学生将口语学习不仅仅停留在传统的机械背诵和模仿上,而是通过大量的任务型课堂活动来强化英语语言的运用能力,使英语真正成为表达学生个人情感和思想的"交际工具"。

为了更好地与高中英语教学大纲衔接,本教材第1册主要为各种日常会话,对话的地点在国内,背景则是中国学生所熟悉的各种口语交际活动的场所。内容主要涉及介绍相识、打电话、谈论天气、邀请聚会、用餐、购物、看病、吉庆假日、娱乐和体育运动等日常生活中的用语。从第2册起,部分对话的地点和背景将移向国外,商务活动内容逐渐增多。这种结构安排为学生对背景和专业知识的了解,提供了一个从"熟悉"到"不熟悉"的渐进过程,从而使英语学习能以难点分散、反复巩固、循序渐进的螺旋上升方式进行。

《新编商务英语口语》共分 4 册,总教学课时为 360 学时,每册为 90 学时。第 1、2 册各为 16 单元;第 3、4 册各为 15 单元。本册每单元分为四大部分:课前练习 (Warm-up)、样板对话(Dialogues)、交际功能范句(Functional Expressions)和交际活动(Communicative Tasks)。其中样板对话和交际功能范句的内容另配有磁带。

第1部分为样板对话,供教师和学生在课堂上使用。对话语言生动活泼,口语特点鲜明,人物活动的情节引人入胜。对话示范性地展示了各种日常和商务活动场合中的英语口语表达的结构和方式,使学生能在较短的时间内掌握准确而得体的日常和商务口语。

第2部分为交际功能范句,这部分旨在向学生提供在某一语言交际功能中可以使用的各种表达方式。需要指出的是:虽然在某一功能下,有各种各样的句子可供选用,但是,这并不等于说,说话者为了完成某一功能可以随意"挑"一个句子说说就行了。在很多情况下,会话的场合、会话双方的社会地位和身份以及会话的目的决定了只有某一个句子才是这种特定会话环境中最恰当的表达语;而在某些情况下,用不同的语气和语调说出同一个句子,则表达了说话者完全不同的意思。这种句意与语气语调之间的微妙关系,需要在教师的指导下,经过较长时间的学习才能掌握。

第3部分为交际活动,这些活动均与对话主题或交际功能相关。这是本教材区别于许多其他英语口语教材的重要特点之一。这种交际任务为学生提供了一个检验自己学习成果和在现实生活中实践英语语言运用能力的机会。样板对话和交际功能范句的学习是进行交际活动的基础,交际任务又是学生对样板对话和交际功能范句消化吸收和对英语语言规则内化的一个必不可少的语言习得步骤。在进行交际活动时,教师应特别注意学生中可能出现的重语言形式、轻语言意义和在课堂上机械地模仿样板对话和交际功能范句的"伪交际"现象。在以语法翻译法和听说法为主要教学方法的中学英语课堂上,这种现象是屡见不鲜的。为了减少和避免这种"伪交际"现象,教师应尽量为课堂交际任务和活动提供真实的实践背景和必要的语言词汇,在教学中提高学生语言技能运用的时间比例,使学生逐步学会和学提表达自己想要表达的真实思想和观点的方法。必要时,教师可以因地制宜地对本部分交际任务的活动内容作适当的修正。

第4部分课后任务选用了8部现代风格的独幕话剧。这些话剧的主题既有与

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学生的专业相关的商务活动,也有大学生们喜闻乐见的传统题材,还有的能帮助学生了解西方文化和家庭伦理观念。如同第2册中的电影片段,所有这些独幕话剧的语言十分生动,当代口语特点鲜明。其中一些口语的用法是任何一本国内口语教材中极为罕见的,如打招呼的用语 How's the day been? 以及相应的回答 Not bad. Not good, either, by the sound of it 等。对于这部分的内容,可以学生自学为主。教师也可安排学生互检,或课堂抽查,督促学生按时完成自学任务;还可以组织成立各种兴趣小组,以"探究型"的形式,让学生自已收集和整理各种语言现象,在班级活动中展示其研究成果,如:按语言功能分类的日常用语和口语与书面语的异同等。

总之,我们希望学生通过对本教材的学习,不仅能听懂日常和商务英语会话,能以准确的语调进行英语会话,自由地表达自己的思想和观点;而且能逐步养成用符合特定场合的得体语言回答或者提出各种问题的习惯,为今后工作做好充分准备。

在编写这套教材的过程中,我们得到了国内外同行的启示和高等教育出版社编辑的帮助。英籍专家 Frank Tonge 协助审阅了本教材的全部语言文字并参与了部分课文的编写工作。在此,对所有关心、支持和帮助本书编写和出版的人员表示衷心的感谢。同时,由于编者水平和经验有限,本书可能有疏漏和不当之处,我们诚恳希望外语教育专家和使用本书的广大师生不吝指教。

Nobody is quite sure where the name comes from. Some say it is


related to King George III.
