

### 前言

本书是《在职攻读硕士学位全国联考英语教学大纲》编订后出版的第一部词汇练习专用书,也是作者多年词汇教学经验的总结。该书的特点如下:

- 1. 编排独特,注重实效。运用自如比识别词义更加重要。考虑到读者在主动使用英语词汇时的困难,该书的内容不仅仅是选项练习,也包括汉译英词组练习和词形练习。汉译英练习涉及的词汇以大纲规定词汇为主,按英语字母顺序排列,覆盖绝大部分单词和词组,但也增加少量同义词和常用词。目的是提高读者的词汇使用熟练程度,减少其写作和翻译方面的困难。增添词形练习旨在提高使用词汇的效率并减少拼写错误。
- 2. 重点突出,覆盖面宽。本书练习的重点为词形相近的词、有一定难度的词、易混淆的词和人们不熟悉而又常用的词义。词组和常用短语也占一定比例。通过对大纲词汇做精心的筛选,本书确保读者对重点词汇的意义和用法有进一步的了解,从而从根本上提高阅读能力。由于该书中出现的词汇众多,读者只要认真完成每项练习,就可以遇到几乎所有规定的词汇。
- 3. 附有注释,加深印象。为了使读者理解某些词和词组的用法和区别、答案部分附有解释,说明正确选项的合理性,另外对某些难懂的句子也翻译成汉语。汉译英练习的答案尽量提供多种译法。

本书设法减少读者在英语学习中可能遇到的困难,尽量满足不同层次读者的需要,提高其英语水平。但由于作者水平有限,无法做到尽善尽美。欢迎读者在使用后评定并不吝赐教。
