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前 言

一、《英语听力》是上海市业余外语广播讲座英语听力课教材。如何听懂英语，这是学英语的同志所普遍遇见的问题。开设本课的目的就是给英语初学者提供内容深浅、语速快慢适度的材料，锻炼听力，提高听懂英语的能力，增加学习兴趣。

二、在听力训练上，本课采用精听与泛听相结合的方法。精听，分初级班与中级班两种程度。精听材料，生词与语言难点进行适当的控制，播送语速较慢，重复次数较多。每篇播送后均有听力检查练习，测验理解程度。泛听，主要是为了提供更多的听英语的机会，内容有难有易。为了帮助听众学习，凡是语言难点均加注释。

三、《英语听力》(3)，主要包括：听故事、广播短剧、教唱歌曲、诗歌、听力测验和谜语等项。训练听力时，听众最好事先不要看材料，以期更好地达到训练效果。
