EPISODE 1 THE DECORATORS 第一集 室内装饰师

SCENE 1: SITTING ROOM/EVENING

(JIM IS SEATED AT TABLE WITH HIS CLOCKS. BETTY IS WANDERING AROUND THE ROOM.)

BETTY: We'll have pale grey on the door and the windows.

And a nice pattern on the wallpaper in pale green or lemon. Oh, we do need a new carpet. What colour should the carpet be, do you think?

Jim!

JIM: What? Yes, yes. I'm sure you're right. Yes.

BETTY: I said, what colour should the carpet be?

JIM: Carpet? What carpet?

BETTY: The carpet in here1.

JIM: Oh, well that's a sort of a browny, gold and beige

colour carpet . . .

BETTY: I mean the new one.

JIM: Do we need a new carpet?

BETTY: Yes, we do!

JIM: Oh.

(JIM LOOKS BACK TO TABLE. BETTY LEANS OVER AND RAISES HIS WATCH GLASSES.2)

BETTY: You never listen to a word I say. I want to redecorate this room.

JIM: Redecorate?

BETTY: We talked about it last night.

JIM: Did we? Oh, yes. Yes, hmmm, I think it's exactly all right the way it is3.

BETTY: It is not all right the way it is. Now, have you

looked at the wallpaper patterns?

JIM: Wallpaper—wallpaper patterns! Now, that reminds me. Do you know what happened to me today?

BETTY: No dear.

(JIM OPENS HIS BRIEFCASE AND DEMON-STRATES HIS POINTS WITH ACTIONS.)

JIM: I had an important meeting with a very important client. We're going to build him a new factory. "Sit down", I said, "Here", I said, "are the plans for our new factory?"

(JIM SPREADS WALLPAPER PATTERNS ON THE TABLE.)

BETTY: Oh!

JIM: Oh. Those are not the plans for the new factory. **BETTY:** No dear. Those are the patterns for the new wall-paper.

JIM: How did they get into my briefcase?

BETTY: Well, I put them in there last night so that you can choose which one you like. I think this one's rather nice, don't —?

JIM: Darling, look, look, please, please don't put wallpaper patterns in amongst my business documents. The client was very angry.

BETTY: Didn't he like any of them?

JIM: Well—no, he did not! And this room does not need redecorating. Far too expensive.

SCENE 2: HALL/EVENING

(BETTY ENTERS HALL FROM SITTING ROOM AND OPENS FRONT DOOR. LISA & ALAN ENTER.)

BETTY: Lisa! Alan!

LISA: Hello, Mum! We're home!

ALAN: Hi, Mum!

BETTY: Well, how did you manage to arrive together?

ALAN: I picked Lisa up5 from school-

BETTY: Oh, but this is wonderful! There's nothing to eat.

I thought you were coming tomorrow,

LISA: Oh, that doesn't matter.

SCENE 3: SITTING ROOM/EVENING

LISA: Hello, Dad! Same clock6?

JIM: Yes, same clock.

ALAN: Hi, Dad!

JIM: Hello.

ALAN: Same clock?

JIM: Same clock, yes, very good.

ALAN: Oh, well, it's good to be back!

JIM: Well, this is fun. Home for the weekend, are we?

ALAN: The weekend? The college has broken up7 for the

summer holiday, Dad.

LISA: So has my school.

JIM: Holiday?

BETTY: They'll be home for eight weeks.

JIM: Eight weeks! Oh—splendid.

ALAN: Eight weeks is a long time. I could write my novel.

LISA: I'm going to learn Tai Chi⁹.

BETTY: I've just had a wonderful idea. Alan and Lisa can do the decorating¹⁰.

LISA: What decorating?

BETTY: Your father wants to redecorate this room.

JIM: I want ...?

BETTY: And they can do it.

ALAN: Us?

JIM: That settles it¹¹. This room stays exactly the way it is.

BETTY: Oh, but Jim, it won't cost so much if they do it.

And it would look very nice, if they do it.

You'll do it very well, won't you?

Yes, of course you would. Now, I've got a list of

things here that need to be done.

Your father will pay you for doing it.

JIM: Pay them? They're part of the family¹². They should do it for nothing.

BETTY: Shall we say three pounds an hour? That's not too much.

JIM: That is three pounds an hour too much!

LISA: We'll do it, Dad. It's a deal13!

ALAN: Right!

BETTY: I want pale grey paint on the doors and windows, and, umm, a pattern on the wallpaper. I think this one...

JIM: I do not want this room redecorated.

ALAN: It's no use, Dad. You can't win,

LISA: Mum will have her own way. She always does in the end¹⁴.

ALAN: You don't want to pay for professional decorators.

LISA: So you may as well¹⁵ settle for us.

JIM: At three pounds an hour!

BETTY: That's settled then16.

SCENE 4: SITTING ROOM/DAY

(ALAN IS ON A STEPLADDER, APPLYING PAINT MESSILY. LISA ENTERS WITH ROLLS OF WALLPAPER.)

LISA: Right, Alan. I've got the rest of the wallpaper. It should be enough.

ALAN: I don't like that wallpaper. I don't see why we should have flowers anyway. We should have something... I don't know... different... and better!

LISA: Look, this is the one Mum wants, so this is the one we put up, right?

ALAN: I might have known.¹⁷ I'm going back to my ladder, where it's safe.

LISA: Alan, don't you think I should do the painting?

ALAN: Listen! This is a job for a man. You'd probably fall off the ladder, all right?

(BETTY ENTERS WITH TEA TRAY.)

BETTY: Here you are, you workers. I've brought some tea for you both.

LISA: Oh, thanks Mum.

ALAN: Thanks Mum.

BETTY: Do you want a b scuit darling?

LISA: Ooh, yeah.

BETTY: Alan! Come on 18, have a rest 19 now.

ALAN: OK

(ALAN STARTS DOWN LADDER, MISSES HIS FOOTING AND SLIDES THE REST OF THE WAY, ENDING UP ON THE FLOOR. BETTY GOES TO HIM, STILL HOLDING THE TEATRAY.)

BETTY: Alan! Are you all right?

ALAN: Yeah, I'm all right. My foot slipped, that's all.

LISA: And he thinks I might fall off the ladder!

BETTY: You must be more careful!

ALAN: Yes, I'll be careful.

(ALAN RISES, TURNING HIS BACK UNDERNEATH THE TRAY, HURLING THE TEA THINGS

OVER THE FLOOR.)

LISA: He'll be careful!

SCENE 5: SITTING ROOM/DAY

(LISA IS PAINTING THE DOOR. ALAN ENTERS, KNOCKING PAINT BRUSH AGAINST HER NOSE.)

LISA: Oh!

ALAN: Hey! You look nice with a painted nose!

LISA: I wonder what you'd look like?

(LISA DABS PAINT BRUSH ON ALAN'S NOSE.)

ALAN: Ooh!

SCENE 6: SITTING ROOM/DAY

(ALAN IS APPLYING ADHESIVE TO A SECTION BY THE DOOR. LISA IS MEASURING WALL-PAPER:)

LISA: Alan! Alan! Don't leave the bucket there by the

door. Someone might fall over20 it.

ALAN: I don't see why. We both know it's there.

LISA: Right, that's about two metres, forty centimetres.

ALAN: No, it isn't. This piece is much smaller. And it's narrower too. Here, let me measure it.

LISA: Not likely! It's very easy to measure it wrongly.

ALAN: Let me measure it!

LISA: All right!

(ALAN UNREELS THE MEASURE, LISA IS HOLDING THE OTHER END.)

ALAN: Well, let go²¹!

(LISA L'ETS GO, AND THE MEASURE WHIPS BACK INTO THE REEL, STINGING ALAN'S FINGERS.)

ALAN: Ouch! (BETTY ENTERS.)

BETTY: How are you getting on—? Oh, I say!

Don't leave the bucket there, dear. Someone might fall over it. Oh, you have nearly finished. Oh, doesn't it look lovely? I love those flowers. They're not too pale and not too dark. Your father's going to be so pleased. Here he is now!

SCENE 7: HALL/DAY

JIM: Betty, darling!

(BETTY ENTERS FROM SITTING ROOM)

BETTY: Hello, dear. Did you have a good day at the office?

JIM: Yes, splendid, thank you.

BETTY: We've got a wonderful surprise for you.

JIM: Surprise?

BETTY: Just go into the sitting room.

SCENE 8: SITTING ROOM/DAY

(AS JIM ENTERS, HE STEPS INTO BUCKET OF WALLPAPER ADHESIVE.)

ALAN: Oh, Dad! Dad!

LISA: Dad! No!

ALAN: Be careful!

LISA: Oh!

(JIM HAS STAGGERED ACROSS THE ROOM AND LANDED ON THE SOFA, WITH THE

BUCKET STILL STUCK TO HIS FOOT.)

ALAN: What do you think of the decorations, Dad?

EPISODE 2 MUSIC MAN 第二集 音乐迷

SCENE 1: KITCHEN & HALL/DAY

(BETTY ENTERS KITCHEN, FROM GARDEN, WITH A BUNCH OF CHIVES, WHICH SHE STARTS TO WASH AND CHOP².)

BETTY: Hello, darling!

JIM: Hello!

BETTY: Did you have a good day at the office?

JIM: No. BETTY: Oh.

JIM: 1 went to the Lingfield construction site.

BETTY: Ah—how was it?

JIM: Very noisy. Clang, clang, bang, bang, hour after hour. People shouldn't have to put up with that sort of thing³. My head's still splitting.

BETTY: Never mind, you're home now.

JIM: Yes. Good to be home for a bit of peace and quiet.

(JIM & BETTY GO THROUGH TO HALL. LOUD

MUSIC IS HEARD FROM THE SITTING ROOM.)

JIM: Holy Moses! What's that noise?

(JIM & BETTY RUSH INTO SITTING ROOM.)

SCENE 2: SITTING ROOM/DAY

(JIM & BETTY ENTER. ALAN IS LISTENING TO HI-FI.6)

JIM: What on earth's that racket? Stop that!
Alan, will you stop that!

BETTY: Alan! Stop it! Switch it off! Off!

(ALAN SWITCHES OFF HI-FI)

BETTY: Oh, that's better, dear.

Better dear! Your father had a very busy day. He needs some peace. Oh, I'll see to the dinner.8

ALAN: (POINTING TO HI-FI) What do you think of it then, Dad—eh?
60 watts per channel, with double speakers.9
It's terrific, 10 isn't it?

JIM: Terrific? Where did you get it?

ALAN: It belongs to my friend Terry. He let me borrow it

JIM: Good. He can have it back tomorrow then, can't he?

ALAN: Oh, there's no hurry. Terry said I can keep it as long as I like.

(ABOUT TO¹¹ SWITCH IT ON AGAIN)

JIM: No! Don't! Don't do that! Don't put it on!

ALAN: Why not? What's the matter?

JIM: Don't you know that loud noise is a form of pollu-

tion? It can make people go deaf.12

ALAN: Well, this isn't noise. It's music.

JIM: You can't call that music!

ALAN: You should listen to it, Dad.

> (ALAN SWITCHES HI-FI ON AGAIN. JIM CRIES OUT, PUTTING HIS HANDS OVER HIS EARS.)

No, don't - put it - Alan! Will you take that off! JIM:

Take it, take it—Alan, take that—

(JIM GOES TO HI-FI AND REACHES OUT TO

SWITCH.)

No. Dad! ALAN:

> (JIM GETS AN ELECTRIC SHOCK FROM THE SWITCH. ALAN HURL'S HIMSELF TO THE FLOOR AND PULLS THE PLUG OUT. JIM FALLS BACKWARDS INTO CHAIR.)

Dad! ALAN:

JIM: (RAISES HIS HEAD FAINTLY) Alan!

(BENDING OVER HIM) Yes, Dad? What is it? ALAN:

JIM: You play one more record on that machine, and it goes straight out the window—and you after it!13

SCENE 3: SITTING ROOM/NIGHT

(LISA & ALAN ON SOFA, SORTING THROUGH RECORDS.)

ALAN: Do you know what Shakespeare once said?

LISA: What did Shakespeare once say?

ALAN: "The man that has no music in his soul is capable of..." um, well, all sorts of terrible things. He's a very bad man.

LISA: You don't really think Dad is a very bad man, do you?

Well, he doesn't like music! ALAN:

LISA: Perhaps it depends which music.¹⁴

(SELECTS A RECORD)

I'd like to hear this. (GOES TO HI-FI)

ALAN: No! Dad said we mustn't play any more records. He's gone to bed now. He'll be very angry if he hears it.

LISA: If he doesn't hear it, then he won't mind, will he?

ALAN: Of course he'll hear it.

LISA: He won't if we play it very quietly.

ALAN: Play it quietly?

LISA: All we have to do is turn the volume down.¹⁵

ALAN: Oh, turn the volume down! I never thought of that!

(JIM & BETTY IN BEDROOM. JIM HAS FALLEN ASLEEP, BETTY REMOVES HIS GLASSES, AND TURNS OFF LAMP.)

ALAN: Be careful not to touch that one. Or you'll get a shock like Dad. There are several things wrong with that amp.¹⁶

LISA: What else is wrong with it?

ALAN: I'm not really sure. But if you touch it, use your foot.

LISA: This must be the volume.

ALAN: Yeah.

LISA: (PUTS A RECORD ON) Ready?

ALAN: Ready.

(LISA SWITCHES ON AND MUSIC BL'ARES OUT AS LOUDLY AS EVER.)

(JIM & BETTY WAKE UP STARTLED AND SIT UPRIGHT.)

SCENE 4: KITCHEN/DAY

(BETTY IS POURING COFFEE. SHE SWITCHES RADIO ON TO LISTEN TO MORNING RECIPE. ALAN ENTERS.)

ALAN: Is Dad around?

BETTY: He's gone to work.

ALAN: That's all right then.

(FIDDLES¹⁷ WITH RADIO. BETTY LOSES REC-IPE¹⁸) Any breakfast?

BETTY: You're too late. Get it for yourself.

ALAN: How do I make an omelette?19

BETTY: Get two eggs and a bowl.

ALAN: Eggs, eggs —

BETTY: Bowl. Your father was very angry last night.

ALAN: We tried to turn the volume down, but the machine was broken again. Now what do I do?

BETTY: You break the eggs into the bowl, gently. And you must promise me not to play any more records on that machine.

ALAN: All right.

(ALAN BREAKS EGG INTO BOWL AND IT SPREADS ALL OVER HIS FINGERS.)

ALAN: Oh!

BETTY: Oh, you just go and wash yourself. I'll do it. Now, you break the eggs gently, on the side of the bowl, like this — Alan, like this, and then it doesn't go everywhere.

ALAN: Mum, how am I going to live without music?

BETTY: Well, in my day, music was different. It was nice and tuneful.

ALAN: Yeah, but that was a long time ago.

BETTY: Not so very long ago! Then you add a little milk, like this, and then a little salt. Carefully.

ALAN: Hey, Mum! If I can't play records, can I play a guitar?

BETTY: Play a guitar? You don't know how to.

ALAN: I could learn.

BETTY: Just one guitar, on its own?

ALAN: Well, you can't play two at once!20

BETTY: A guitar can't be as noisy as those records.

ALAN: And Dad wouldn't mind a guitar, would he?

BETTY: Well, you'll have to ask him.

ALAN: You ask him for me.

BETTY: Why me?
