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编者的话

近年来,随着我国对外经济、文化、技术交往的不断扩大,每年都有数以万计的人赴欧、美、澳等地区和国家考察,访问,进修或攻读学位。语言,作为交流的重要手段,已成为他们必须解决的重要问题。同时,他们也急切地希望知道什么是出国的英语标准以及如何检测自己现有的英语水平。《出国人员英语水平测试模拟试卷汇集》(以下简称"汇集")正可以满足大家的这一渴求。

《汇集》是我们在多年出国人员英语培训过程中所积累的大量英、美国家英语测试资料的基础上,经反复比较,选择。并模拟我国教育部有关出国英语测试的标准而整理、编写的。测试的项目既包括了美国 TOEFL 的主要测试内容,如听力,语法,词汇,阅读,也编入了英国 ELT 中最能反映英语水平的写作与综合填空项目,并力图在形式、选材和难度等方面最大限度地接近现代英语测试的水准。

《汇集》试图通过每份模拟试卷向读者揭示出现代英语测试的特点与趋势,即量多、面广、速度快、难度大。以语法测试为例,《汇集》表明,传统的、机械式的语法结构操练题已逐渐演变为句子结构,词汇词义及句子逻辑纵横交织,隐晦,曲折的综合性试题,从而搜醒读者,不仅要熟练掌握英语语法结构,而且要特别注意掌握典型的、表现英语特色的语言现象,如惯用法。又如,《汇集》根据当今阅读理解测试的"三快"(阅读快,理解快,反应快)要求,选辑了题材、体裁各异,篇幅略同但数量多于TOEFL的短文,编写了含蓄型、判断性的理解题,鞭策应试者去提高阅读速度,增强理解能力。再如"听力测试",我们在仔细研究了国外大量听为试题,特别是TOEFL八十年

代的听力试题后,总结出带有普遍规律的类型及新的发展趋势, 并使之在《汇集》"听力测试"题中尽可能得到较全面的、集中的 反映,读者若能反复练习,定会受益匪浅。

《汇集》的读者不只限于各类出国人员,报考国内外非英语专业研究生的人员也可从中得到裨益。如《汇集》中的"综合填空",不但是赴英人员必考的项目,也是研究生入学英语考试中的一个重要测试项目。它集语法、词汇、逻辑思维于一体,要求应试人员不但要有较扎实的语法和词汇的功底,而且要有较严密的逻辑思维、丰富的学识及良好的语感,最能考察一个人综合运用语言知识的能力。《汇集》中的十二篇"综合填空"有一定的难度和深度,读者可用它作为衡量自己综合运用语言知识能力的标尺。此外,《汇集》所提供的十二篇作文题及其范文对于大、中学校的教师,科技人员以及有志于提高英语水平的自学者都不失为一份训练和指导的有益资料。全国各类出国人员英语培训班也可用它作为训练教材。

《汇集》共收入模拟试卷十份、教育部出国英语水平测试试卷两份,共有语法结构题 240 道,词汇题 240 道,阅读理解题 480 道,综合填空题 240 道,听力题 420 道(附录音带及文字材料),作文十二篇(附范文),以及全部试题的参考答案。

《汇集》在编著过程中曾得到南京航空学院外语数研室顾伟刚副教授、美籍教师 Kimberly A. Chang 和 Timothy Vinzani的大力支持,他们审校了全部文字材料。上海外文书店张增雄同志对本书提出了许多有价值的建议,在此一并表示衷心的谢意。由于编者水平所限,《汇集》中谬误之处在所难免,敬望读者不吝赐教,提出宝贵的批评和意见。
