前言

近几年来,我们多次辅导过我校准备报考硕士研究生的学生,并对近几届的英语试题及考生答卷作了一些分析研究。针对学生在考试中容易犯的错误和不好掌握的语言难点,我们曾选编了"研究生英语考试复习材料习题集",试图通过大量的练习来帮助学生较熟练地掌握某些重要的语法现象和基本词汇的用法,提高学生的语言综合应用能力。现为了满足更多读者的需要,我们根据目前研究生入学考试和出国生考试的要求,结合我们多年的教学经验,对原习题集作了大量的修改和补充,编写了这本《英语考试复习指导》——供报考研究生和出国生使用(上、下册)。

本书上册包括语法练习题,力图反映各种句型及惯用法,并针对当前学生在词汇方面的弱点,编选了大量词汇练习,尤其是各种词的搭配和同义词辨别等练习。下册编入了大量综合性练习,包括辨认错误、综合填充、阅读理解和汉译英等。

书中的练习题和试题主要选自美国、 英国、 日本、 新加坡、香港等国家和地区以及国内编写的英语试题和书籍。 习题 力求内容丰富全面,形式多样。对各种语言现象,采取了分类集中编排和综合练习相结合的形式,以便于读者系统复习和总结,达到切实掌握和记忆。

对部分语言现象,特别是对读者不好掌握或容易犯错误的语言难点我们作了较详细的注释,对某些语言现象则作了适当的总结和扩充,希望藉此能加深读者对这些内容的理解,并便

于具有一定英语水平的读者自学。

《书宋附有四套模拟试题。读者在做了大量习题后可以试作,以检验自己复习的效果。此外,本书还收集了近几年来研究生英语入学考试试题三套。

本书在编写过程中,得到清华大学外语系领导、全体英语教师以及职工同志的大力支持和帮助,在此谨表示 衷 心 的 谢 意。全书由程慕胜、陆慈两位同志审阅,周静华同志也参加了审阅工作。

由于编者水平有限,经验不足,书中肯定存有不少缺点和错误。衷心希望广大读者和使用本书的英语教师批评指正。
